

Detectives aver that they have evidence to the effect that he was well acquainted with Miss Phagan, and that they were good friends during his street car career. Also, that they were often seen talking together as she rode his car to and from her home to her work in the penell plant.

The prisoner is a frank, outspoken youth. If is 28 years old, dark-hafred, quick-witted and straight-limbed. He is 6 feet tall, and rapid of speech. Since he was discharged from the street rallway service because of injuries he recelved in a recent trolley car acclifent, he has been employed with the Mer-chants' Towel Supply company.

He has been, confined to a single cell. No one is permitted to see him and explicit orders have been given by Chief Lanford that he he allowed to communicate with no one. He is vindictive toward the men who necus him of having been with Miss Phagan on the night she was slain.
