Mr. Marshall argued at length for his client today before Justice Lamar and presented a detailed brief, which was an elaboration of points cited in regard to the writ of error. After denying the writ Justice New-man denied to Frank an appeal to the high court in Washington. Today when he argued for the writ Mr. Marshall presented, in addition to his brief, a certificate for the Justice's signature. presented, in addition to his brief, a certificate for the Justice's signature, declaring that there was probably rea-son for an appeal to the Supreme Court. If Justice Lamar does not sign this cer-tificate it is probable that the appeal will be taken to Justice Holmes and will be taken to Justice Holmes and possibly to other Justices. The appeal cannot be taken to the full court before Jan. 4, when it will reconvene after the

Christmas recess. Pending Justice Lamar's decision, Mr. Marshall is withholding his brief from publication. Mr. Marshall said this aft-ernoon that he was not certain yet whether he would return to Washing-ton on Saturday to receive the decision.
