The proposed meeting has been advertised in the newspapers and by handbills. The advertisements state that the meeting will be "for the purpose of defending and preserving the right of trial by jury, and the defense and support of the integrity of the Constitution and Government of Georgia, by Georgians in Georgia."

It is the outgrowth of the movement for a mass meeting in every county in Georgia to protest against commutation for Frank.

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
