Mrs. Wright was well known in this vicinity as a friend of dumb animals. With her husband, the late Seaman L. Wright, she lived for more than forty years in the old homestead.

FRANK'S JUDGE DYING HERE.

L. S. Roan, Who Presided at Atlanta Trial, Suffering from Cancer.

Judge L. S. Roan, who presided at the trial of Leo M. Frank for the murder of Mary Phagan in Atlanta, is critically ill of cancer at the Polyclinic Hospital. The hospital authorities would not admit last night that Judge Roan was dying, but members of his family have been summoned by telegraph from Atlanta. Judge Roan went to the nespital a week ago, and his condition has grown worse from day to day.

Judge Roan presided at Frank's original trial, and on Aug. 25, 1913, sentenced him to die on Oct. 10, 1913. An appeal for a new trial automatically caused a stay of execution, and when Frank was arraigned for resentence on March 7, 1914, Judge Benjamin H. Hill had succeeded Judge Roan in the case. But it was Judge Roan who presided throughout the trial when the demonstrations of persons who believed Frank guilty attracted such attention.
