

WILL REAR MONUMENT TO LITTLE MARY PHAGAN

Atlanta lodge No. 720, Brotherhood Railway Trainmen, headed by J. M. Hurton, secretary, has inaugurated a movement to erect a monument to the memory of Mary Phagan who was slain in the National Pencil factory, and for whose murder Leo M. Frank has been sentenced to hang.

Resolutions passed by the trainmen order set forth that the type of womanhood represented by the slain girl, weak in physical strength and bowed down by the weight of poverty, barred from opportunity and pleasure, holds the priceless jewel of virtue at the stake of her life and, that in memorial of her death, a befitting tribute should be erected.

The resolutions will be presented to the next meeting of the Atlanta Federation of Trades.

AMERICAN ANNUITY CO. ORDERED LIQUIDATED

Through what was practically a consent order, Judge George L. Bell directed yesterday the liquidation of the affairs of the American Annuity company, which has assets of about \$54,000 and liabilities in excess of that amount.

The company has been in the hands of the state insurance department since July 17, when Judge W. D. Ellis ordered Comptroller General Wright to take charge of it. General Wright is now working out a plan to reinsure the policy-holders and thus protect as far as possible the insurance they carry in the company.
