

BURNS EXPECTED TO RETURN SOON

Generally Believed That
He Left Atlanta to Inves-
tigate Cincinnati Angle to
Leo Frank Case.

The destination of Detective Wil-
liam J. Burns, who left Saturday after-
noon at 5:10 o'clock over the Louis-
ville and Nashville railroad, is being
kept a secret by Burns attaches in
Atlanta.

Although it was rumored that the
detective was en route to Cincinnati,
where he goes to interview Dewey
Howell, Burns officials in Atlanta
would neither deny nor verify the re-
port Sunday afternoon. They remain-
ed reticent regarding their chief's
journey.

It is said, however, that he will re-
turn soon, probably tomorrow.

SLADE SHOT TO DEATH BY OFFICER MATTHEWS

Cordele, Ga., April 12.—News has
just been received here that Thomas
J. Slade, Jr., formerly deputy sheriff
of Crisp county and connected with one
of the prominent families of the
county, was shot and killed by Police-
man Matthews, at Oakfield, a small
town about sixteen miles south of this
city, in the northern part of Worth
county, today at 4 o'clock. It has not
been learned what was the cause of
the trouble and Oakfield cannot be
reached tonight by telephone. Slade
is survived by a mother and two
brothers.
