FRANK CASE DECISION MAY BE GIVEN TODAY

A decision in the Leo Frank case may be handed down by the supreme court today. The court has been in session for two days now, and it is expected that the case will be decided on most any time.

If the decision is favorable to Mr. Frank, the case goes back to the superior court, where Judge Ben Hill will hear the motion to set aside the verdict on its merits. If unfavorable, it will have the effect, according to lawyers, of taking the case forever from the courts of Fulton county.

NO OFFICIAL DINNERS AT THE WHITE HOUSE

Washington, November 10. -There will be no official dinners and receptions at the white house this year, it was learned definitely tonight, because of the death of Mrs. Wilson. The return of Miss Margaret Wilson today from a visit to her sister, Mrs. F. B. Sayre, at Williamstown, Mass. brought the question to the forefront.

By abandoning formal dinners and recoptions for the season the president has avoided what officials say would have been an embarrassing situation. A dinner and a reception always have been given in honor of the diplomatic corps. At present, however, representatives here of Great Britain, France, Russia and Japan are not on speaking terms with those of Germany, Austria-Hungary and Turkey,
