### SECRET HUNT BY BURNS IN MYSTERY IS LIKELY

Probably Will Not Reveal Presence in City as He Investigates Phagan Case.

Colonel Thomas B. Filder said Wednesday that Detective William J. Burns had not arrived, as yet, in New York from his European trip, but that as soon as he did he undoubtedly would start at once for Atlanta to work upon the Mary Phagan strangling mystery.

Colonel Filder is acquainted with the day and the hour on which the famous sleuth will reach this city, but for the purposes of the investigation he is withholding the information.

"There was an authority for the statement that Detective Burns would be here Tuesday," said Colonel Filder. "The date of his arrival has been known to my office, but it has not been made public."

It is quite likely that the great detective will come quietly and unannounced into the city, make his investigation of the mystery and slip out before many persons are aware from their own knowledge that he has been working on the case.

In Touch With Burns Agency. Colonel Filder has been in constant touch with Raymond Burns, son of the detective, who is secretary and treasurer of the Burns Agency, and has offices in New York. The agency is being placed in possession of the important new developments in the mystery as rapidly as they occur. An outline of the whole case will be laid before Burns the instant he arrives at his New York office.

That increasing importance being attached to the notes that were found beside the dead body of Mary Phagan was indicated Wednesday when several handwriting experts were called before Solicitor General Hugh M. Dorsey.

An expert testified at the Coroner's inquest that the notes, in his opinion, were written by Nott Lee, the night watchman at the National Biscuit Factory. The expert was corroborated by the unimpaired testimony of two other experts.

The solicitor, however, has not been satisfied with the evidence he had on this important point. Experts were found who disagreed with the conclusions presented to the coroner's jury. The writing in the notes found near the body of Mary Phagan, they declared, was much better than the normal writing of Nott Lee.

Differences in the Hand. The writing showed evidence of the left hand, which Lee did not possess. Lee would have had to be under instruction for two or three months before he could show the improvement that is evident between the best specimen of his handwriting and the handwriting of the notes.

Lee's normal handwriting shows a decided slant. That of the notes does not. The final letter in each of the words written by Lee ended abruptly. The final letters in the notes were rounded, indicating a consideration by the writer.

A poem said to have been written by Mary Phagan was found in the specimens of her handwriting which will be compared with the specimens in the basement of the National Biscuit Factory. The poem is noted "May 14," and Mary is said by her stepfather, J. W. Coleman, to have been the author.

It is not so millimetric, but, as the writer said, he can do it. The slant of the letter 'e' was not as in the poem. The poem is said to be a deliberate attempt to make another slant some link to Lee.

### BATTLE OVER MODERATOR NEARS HOT CLASH

Race Has Narrowed Down to Drs. Maitland Alexander, Pittsburg, and S. S. Palmer, Columbus.

A spectacular contest for the moderatorship of the Presbyterian Assembly, U. S. A., will reach its climax at 3 o'clock Thursday afternoon when the forces behind Dr. Maitland Alexander, of Pittsburg, and Dr. S. S. Palmer, of Columbus, Ohio, meet in the first test of strength. Dr. William McElbain, president of Lane Theological Seminary, of Cincinnati, has been put forward, but pre-convention gossip has it that the final fight will be between Dr. Alexander and Palmer.

Members of the progressive wing of the denomination are strong in their contention that there is no radical candidate for the moderatorship. They charge that in violation of precedent and the expressed rule of the assembly, an organization has been effected in support of Dr. Alexander and that solicitation for his behalf has been made for months past.

"It has been made to appear, they say, that Dr. Palmer is a radical, and that he is linked up with Union Seminary. Dr. Palmer's friends claim that while he is a progressive, he is not a radical.

No radical can win the moderatorship, according to commissioners who are already here and who are warmly discussing the growing battle of ballots. No ultra-conservative can be elected, they also agree.

Intense interest centers in the fight for moderatorship, the question having a significant bearing on the future policy of the church. It is stated that the moderator appoints the executive committee, a body with considerable power in the assembly, particularly in matters of finance.

"The great question at issue in this Atlanta meeting," said a prominent commissioner Wednesday, "is whether or not the church will continue its present progressive policy or return to the methods in vogue 50 years ago."

The contest for moderator is, in some respects, a fight between the two great Presbyterian agencies of the country, Princeton and Union. It is a recognized fact that Princeton is the most conservative of conservative theological institutions, and that Union has adopted many of the modern tendencies and has on its staff numerous of the most advanced thinkers.

Schools Are Brought In. It is claimed that Dr. Alexander is closely allied with Princeton and that he was offered a place on its board some time ago. It has been a Union Seminary graduate, but it is stated authoritatively that the first McCormick Seminary in Chicago, which is regarded as one of the "best and sane" Presbyterian institutions of the country.

The progressive wing of the church, however, has made a mistake in recommending Dr. Palmer for the job. It is stated that for years he has been a member of the evangelistic committee of the assembly, whose conservatism is unquestioned.

As a result of the agitation by the two forces of the assembly, the work of the Home Mission Board will come to a halt. Ten years ago it adopted a progressive policy, in all things, and has been the leading force in the movement for the modernization of the church. An effort will be made to force the board to return to its old functions.

### CHIEF'S FIVE MEMBERS OF COUNCIL VOTE TO COME HERE

Police Commission Deadlocked on Beavers' Right to Select Men for Promotion.

Friends of Police Chief James I. Beavers Wednesday declared that the long established policy of permitting the chief to select his own officers was the real head of the police department—in a serious jeopardy. The result of the meeting of the Police Commission Tuesday night when the Woodward faction came near voting from the chief the power to nominate officers for promotion.

With the effort was unsuccessful. It went so far as to apparently deadlock the commission over the election of a successor to the late Sergeant J. S. Foster. It is the first time that such a deadlock has been known in the Police Commission.

It was brought about by the Woodward faction, which included Commissioners W. A. Verney and Charles J. Garner, "rurals" and voted with the Woodward faction. Both of these commissioners heretofore have consistently backed the chief and have been regarded as among his warmest supporters, and as opponents of Mayor Woodward.

Their change against the chief made a tie vote—4 to 4—and rendered the election of a successor impossible.

Mark's First Real Clash. The deadlock was the first real clash since Mayor Woodward became a member of the commission. When it became apparent that the commission was deadlocked, hot and fast, and an all-night session seemed imminent, the chief was ultimately adjourned in confusion.

Supporters of Chief Beavers said Wednesday that they were a loss to understand the unexpected lineup of Commissioners Verney and Garner. Mayor Woodward and his staff, Commissioner George B. Johnson, seemed well satisfied.

Friends of Chief Beavers and Chairman Mason, however, expressed their surprise as a surprise in the belief that they would be able to retain the post ground.

Some of the chief's supporters freely asserted that this move by the Woodward faction to cripple the power of Chief Beavers and place elections in the hands of the commission to the opening wedge in a fight to eliminate all service from the department and revert to the old system of biennial election. This proposition one of the hottest factions fight ever known in the police department.

Should the present move of the chief's opponents succeed, it will mean that the chief will have no hand in the selection of officers for promotion.

The fight against Chief Beavers was started by Commissioner Johnson, who, without giving the chief time to defend himself, made a mistake in recommending his choice for promotion, and nominated Roundman Whitley, who the chief was led by Commissioner B. Lee Smith, who declared this move to be a grave injustice to the chief and a mistake in policy.

The chauffeur told the police that the three went together in a boat to a spot on his river. When he attempted to disengage McNeill from shooting, the chauffeur said, he was knocked down, and in the scuffle which followed McNeill was shot in the back of the head.

1. For equal rights and complete justice for all men in all relations of life.
  2. For the protection of the family, by the single standard of purity, uniform divorce laws, proper regulation of marriage and proper housing.
  3. For the fullest possible development for every child, especially by the provision of proper education and recreation.
  4. For the abolition of child labor.
  5. For such regulations of the conditions of toil for woman as the reforming of the physical and moral health of the community.
  6. For the abstention and prevention of poverty.
  7. For the protection of the individual and society from the social, economic and moral waste of the liquor traffic.
  8. For the conservation of health.
  9. For the protection of the worker from dangerous machinery, occupational diseases and mortality.
  10. For aiding workers.
  11. For the right of all men to the opportunity of self-maintenance, for safeguarding this right against encroachment of every kind, and for the protection of workers from the hardships of enforced unemployment.
  12. For suitable provision for the old age of the workers, and for those incapacitated by injury.
  13. For the right of employees and employers alike to organize for adequate means of competition and arbitration in industrial disputes.
  14. For a release from employment on any day in seven.
  15. For the gradual and reasonable reduction of the hours of labor to the lowest practicable point, and for that degree of leisure which is essential to the health of the highest human life.
  16. For a living wage as a condition of the employment of labor.
  17. For the highest wage that each industry can afford.
  18. For a new emphasis upon the application of Christian principles to the regulation and use of property, and for the most equitable division of the product of industry that can ultimately be devised.
