

### MINERS BEGIN NEW STRIKE AS SENATE COMMITTEE PROBES

Industrial War Breaks Out Again in West Virginia Coal Fields as Probe Begins Its Second Week

30,000 EXPECTED TO QUIT AND JOIN OTHERS

No Union Men in Paint and Cabin Creek Districts at Work, and Many Non-Union Miners' Leave, Tools Also

CHARLESTON, June 12.—The industrial war again declared in West Virginia has resumed active development today, and a situation critical and complex.

Word from the isolated sections of Paint Creek and Cabin Creek districts has been that the men had returned to work today at meetings held yesterday but they were unable to make any entry of the number of strikers. They were comparatively few in number in the field, they said, but they believed that both union and non-union men decided to quit.

With the New River district, a few men are at work, but a strike is expected to set off a contingent of 30,000 men, who are expected to quit today. The situation was said to be serious in the Paint and Cabin Creek districts, where 15,000 have threatened to quit. It was feared the non-union men would be the first to quit.

MANILA, June 12.—Complete rout of the rebellious Moros on Mount Bagsag was accomplished by the American forces during the night with the loss of 10 men and seven wounded.

Reports of the engagement, received here by wireless from the island of Jolo, are very meager. All of the American forces were members of the 1st Cavalry division. The Moros were driven from their stronghold by U. S. troops.

Last night's battle began just after dark. The fighting was fierce but the American advance was unopposed. The Moros at last stole away and left the mountain clear. They are now at large and will be pursued incessantly. Brigadier General John Pershing, commanding department in Mindanao, is leading the force.
