### BULGARS MOW DOWN 11,000 SERBS FROM AN ARMY OF 16,000

All of the 4,000 survivors of the Big Battle Near Sofia Are Taken Prisoners, According to Vienna Newspaper

### SERVIAN MINISTER DENIES BULGARIANS WON

Says It Is Not Certain Army Reported Crushed Was In Fight-Greeks Drive Bulgars Across River Struma

VIENNA, July 7.—(AP)—Thousand upon thousand of the Serbian troops were killed in the battle with Bulgarians, according to the official report of the Reichspost. The division consisted of 16,000 men who were annihilated by a Bulgarian army which overtook them. Only 4,000 of the survivors and these were taken prisoners.

According to other newspaper reports, a Bulgarian column of 16,000 men has advanced in reaching the Serbian line of defense and is threatening the line of retreat of the Serbian army. The Bulgarians presumably pushed forward near Parnik.

The Romanian troops are being ordered to the Danube line Bulgaria immediately, and it is assumed that Bulgaria will be compelled either to agree to the German demands and permit them to occupy the territory she desired or to engage in war.
