REORGANIZATION OF RAILWAY MAIL SERVICE

WASHINGTON, July 2.—The reorganization of the railway mail service for the fourth division, embracing the States of Georgia, Florida, Alabama, South Carolina and Tennessee, was announced yesterday afternoon by Postmaster General Burdette. Under the plan, which was approved by the Interstate Commerce Commission, the following appointments were made:

George S. Cobb, of Savannah, will continue with general supervision of the division, which is now headed by Postmaster George W. Rager, transferred to Atlanta, who has been named as chief clerk. Mr. Cobb will be in charge of the Atlanta office.

W. L. Smith, of Atlanta, is promoted to chief clerk and transferred from the Atlanta-Charlotte line to Savannah, Fla., vice Charles Rager, transferred to Pittsburgh, Pa., as chief clerk.

CHANGES APPROVED

The official order making the change outlined will be issued today or tomorrow, and becomes effective at once as the transfers can be made. It is understood that both Rager and Smith will be transferred to their new posts by the end of the month.

Poison Found in Body of Crawford Mary Phagan Pay Envelope Found

Startling Testimony at Hearing of Will Case by Physician, Who Says He Examined Body and Performed Autopsy

MR. CRAWFORD DIDN'T DIE FROM PNEUMONIA, HE SAYS

Testimony Introduced in Effort to Strengthen Contention of Heirs Against Mrs. Mary Crawford

A sensation developed Wednesday morning in the family of Mrs. Mary Belle Crawford, wife of the late Dr. H. H. Harris, when it was learned that a physician, Dr. J. J. Harris, had performed an autopsy on the body of Mrs. Crawford, who died on July 1, 1924, and found unmistakable traces of morphine in the stomach.

This testimony was introduced to strengthen the contention made in the will case of the "Crawford heirs" that Mrs. Mary Belle Crawford, of 614 West Peachtree, the widow and chief beneficiary of the deceased, had poisoned the death of the deceased by the administration of narcotics and opiates.

Previous to the introduction as a witness of Dr. Harris the only testimony which tended in any way to substantiate the sensational allegation was the statement of one witness that she saw Mrs. Mary Belle Crawford take a small amount of morphine from a bottle in the kitchen.

The wife of Dr. H. H. Harris and the late Mrs. Mary Belle Crawford were the only persons who had access to the morphine bottle, which was found in the kitchen at the time of the autopsy.

The physician gave it as his decided opinion that Mrs. Crawford did not die of pneumonia, as Mrs. Mary Belle Crawford had claimed.

Dr. Harris said that from the amount of morphine which he found in the body of the patient it was his opinion that she had taken an amount of morphine which would have been fatal to her.
