## Divorced Wife Kills Judge and His Bride

### JUDGE W. S. GODBEE AND WIFE KILLED IN MILLER POSTOFFICE

#### Jealous Divorcee Sends Volley of Bullets Into Bodies of Unsuspecting Victims, Slaying Man Instantly

#### M. PERFECTLY SATISFIED, DECLARES WOMAN IN JAIL

#### Mrs. Godbee Will Make No Statement—Two Had Been Divorced Several Years Before March Wedding

MILLER, Ga., Aug. 11.—Judge W. S. Godbee and his wife were killed in the Miller postoffice this morning by Mrs. Helen Godbee, Judge's divorced wife.

Judge Godbee, who is nearly 60 years old, and his young wife walked into the postoffice together and soon Mrs. Helen Godbee drew a revolver and fired into the bodies of the judge and his wife. Judge Godbee was killed instantly and his wife died later.

The shooting occurred at a time when many people were in the postoffice as the morning mail had just arrived.

Mrs. Godbee said she and her husband were divorced several years ago. She said she was perfectly satisfied with the divorce and that she had never seen her husband since.

The judge's attorney, who was called to the scene, said that the judge had been in the postoffice for some time before the shooting.

The judge's wife was also in the postoffice at the time of the shooting. She was killed by a bullet from the same revolver.

The judge's body was found in the postoffice and his wife's body was found nearby. Both were killed instantly.
