

To Test Jersey Bulkhead Law.

TRENTON, N. J., May 18.—Alleging that the law passed by the last Legislature, relative to the construction of bulkheads along the Jersey Coast is unconstitutional, James H. Donnelly, of Longport, made an application in the Supreme Court, before Justice Black, this afternoon for a writ of certiorari to review the passage of an ordinance by the Longport Common Council for the construction of bulkheads there. Donnelly holds the law was special legislation.
