WOULD ISOLATE GEORGIA.

States Should Refuse Her Requisitions, Says Chicago Police President.

CHICAGO, Aug. 18.—Edward J. Dodd, President of the Chicago Patrolmen's Association, made public a letter today which he said he had sent to Governor Harris of Georgia. The letter stated that the lynching of Leo M. Frank indicated that Georgia was not capable of self-government, and that therefore he would ask Governor Dunn not to honor requisition papers sent to him by the Governor of Georgia.

In giving out the letter Mr. Dodd explained that it was his intention to request the heads of every policemen's organization in the country to make similar requests of the Governors of their respective States.

Resolutions condemning the lynching of Frank were adopted today at the annual meeting of the Illinois Federation of Colored Women's Clubs. The resolutions remark that nearly forty lynchings have taken place in the United States so far this year.
