These rates were retained by the administration forces in the senate committee, but the republican wing cut down the reserve of the city banks to 15 per cent. The house bill provided for redemption of the new notes in gold or lawful money at the treasury or at the reserve banks. The Owen amendment would make the notes redeemable in gold at the treasury and gold or laxiful money the banks and the republican draft provides for a straight gold redemption in both instances.

Both the house bill and the Own shill would allow country banks to loan one year farm mortgages. The republicans amended this to allow banks to loan one-third of their time deposits on five year farm mortgages.

The republicans eliminated from the bill, a provision which would have required national banks to maintain serarate departments to handle savings account business. Numerous other differences, principally on minor matters or relating to the language of the measure are apparent.

To prevent a disturbance of finatical conditions while bank reserves are being shifted to the proposed new regional banks, the Owen bill would provide that banks may deposit commercial paper and currency as part of their reserve, under certain conditions. #### WHICH SIDE OF THE COW?

It has remained for The Constitution's cartoonist, Lewis Gregg, to raise a statesize and nation-wide issue over this momentous question: Shall a cow be milked on the right or the left-hand side, or on each alternately?

Mr. Gregg's activity in the matter was in all innocence of starting a feud. He had been shot to the core with enthusiasm over Georgia Products Day and the vital significance thereof. It was with difficulty that throughout the preliminary campaign he restrained his up-pent exuberance. The reticence and calm for which he is noted were broken at trequent intervals by ebullitions that startled his triends. His exhilaration came to a climax in the first page cartoon, printed in The Constitution last Tuesday, which has set the agricultural sharps by the ears. Mr. Gregg drew an ornate cow and labeled her "Georgia Farms and Factories." At the trough he symbolized Georgia emptying feed for the cow. On milking stools and at work were "Labor" and "Capital." The teed being poured into the trough was designated "Patronage of Home Industries." The legend was, "The More the Feed, the

The cartoon at once made a tremendous hit. But—and here's the trouble—the public rampantly indorsed the principle of his cartoon, but some of Mr. Gregg's friends cavilled over the fact that the cow was being milked on the left-hand side. No self-respecting and conventional cow in creation, they said, would stand for being milked on any side but the right. Whereupon Mr. Gregg countered to the effect that, as a boy, he learned the gentle art of milking at the leit-hand side of the particular cow that he patronized. It is all in the beginning, he argues. If you start a cow off on the leit-hand side she will remain a left handed cow till the last trump. Il you introduce her to her job on the right-hand side she insists upon that preferential location the rest of her days or plants her hoof in the commissariat of the milker. If you milk her alternately on the right and letthand sides, he avers, you will develop an ambidextrous cow, purring with content and equally proline whether you approach her from the north or the south side. It is solely a matter of habit, he contends.

The issue thus projected is of such unique and startling interest that we invite discussion. Have we been pampering the cow all these years until she has grown tyrannical? Is the right hand theory supported by the physical geography of the cow, as some contend, or is it merely the product of tradition, moth eaten and indolent, whereby toiling humanity has been foolishly immolating its convenience to the selfish and temperamental whims of the cow? The possibilities are disquieting. It does not contribute to the conceit of the race that has harnessed the lightning and discovered the north pole to think now that it may have, these centuries, been held in peopage to-its tyrannical cows.

Let's postpone the Mexican crisis and settle the right, the left and the ambidextrous milking problem.

## THE FRISCO MORAL.

The origin of the present-day financial difficulties of the American railroads is succinctly revealed by the interstate commerce commission probe of the receivership of the Frisco system. The commission is now sitting in St. Louis. Recent dispatches bring interesting revelations of the manner in. which men high in the counsels of the company deliberately milked the road; maneuvered it as a pawn in the game of profit, rather than operated it as a purveyor of transportation; and in many respects the stalking horse of states' rights, pre-

abused and distorted its natural functions. Practices of this sort are the exception in the railroad world of today, for promoters and managers of railroads have learned their lesson at bitter cost, much of which is being paid now. But it cannot be too emphatically driven home that such legal piracy as was exhibited with the Frisco, and which was the

lawed once and for all. Today nearly all railroads, however able their management, are facing extreme difficulty in so stabilizing or increasing their incomes as to make their securities and bonds reasonably marketable. It is the specter of just such financial high jinks as exhibited in the Frisco scandal that explains their prelingeringly suspicious that their money may be diverted to speculative schemes instead

controlling policy in the railroad philosophy

of yesterday, must be discarded and out-

dicament. Prospective investors are still of being spent on betterments. State and federal regulating bodies are naturally wary of granting authority for increase in rates until assurance is given by law that the performances of the past will not be repeated.

The situation thus created has now become intolerable. The railroads must market their securities and modernize their equipment, or subject the business of the country to threat of paralysis. They need. urgently, a billion dollars for the task of rehabilitation. That sum, distributed throughout the channels of trade, will create universal prospérity. Increases in rates, of a reasonable degree, would not be objected to if the public knew that the proceeds would be legitimately applied. But the moral of the Frisco and the New Haven and allied examples stand out as warning.

#### MR. TAFT'S VIEWS.

No one who recognizes the honesty of Mr. Taft's nature will question the sincerity of his criticism of the Wilson policy toward the Philippines. As former governor general of the islands he had exhaustive opportunities for experience and observation, and it is of record that he made excellent use of them. The Philippines have, with him, long been a sort of personal hobby. It is altogether probable that when he approaches the discussion of their problems he speaks without partisan bias and from genuine con-

Mr. Taft believes the Wilson policy of straightway extending more authority to the natives is a mistake. He says the plan of giving the Filipinos control of the commission will lead to endless dissension and set back the work of civilizing the islands. He does not hesitate to declare that the program ot early autonomous rule was set on foot by native politicians, who are wholly out of touch with the people.

The chief weakness to Mr. Taft's criticism is that he does not attach sufficient importance to Mr. Wilson's qualification of the promise of independence a lalso to the necessity of giving the Filipinos a chance to try their wings under due supervision. Speaking for the president, Governor General Burton Harrison stressed particularly that the Filipinos must view actual independence as scheduled at some day in the indefinite future, the date to be realized by the capacity for self-government they themselves demonstrated

Another consideration is that Mr. Taft is temperamentally opposed to anything resembling experiment. His political course is a constant vindication of that principle. Personally lovable and personally consecrated, he is inherently jealous of things that are established and chary of promoting change. These reasons probably explain his disapproval of progress in placing the Filipinos just a little more on probation. We never know if a people are capable of selfgovernment until they are given a trial. In this instance the trial is occurring with abundant checks and restraints. And the multiplying domestic problems of the United States render it highly desirable that we minimize the Philippine strain and menace at as early a date as is reconcilable with justice to the islands and ourselves.

#### THE CENTRALIZATION BOGIE.

Undue importance is attached to the action of the National Conservation Congress. in session at Washington, with regard to federal control of water power. A few of the more extreme advocates of state rights appear to view the congress' indorsement of federal control as just one more step toward domination of the country's institutions from Washington. The Issue is still too much in the formative stage to justify that fear. And after all the attitude of the conservation congress is only that of an unofficial body, and as such cannot be expected to control the policy of the administration.

It is, of course, understood that the president is yet to outline his program with regard to conservation, as well as toward trust regulation, both subjects in a way allied, since each touch questions of broad national industrial development. But it is a safe assertion that whatever he recommends and whenever he recommends it, he will not wantonly trample upon the rights nor invade the powers of the states. His record is all against that, and there are enough men in congress to hold him in check were he wrongfully minded.

A few of the extremists have been inclined to make a bogie out of the tendency toward centralization in government. They overlook the fact that the drift has been steadily in that direction ever since the arbitrament of the civil war, when the nation and not the state was established as the supreme power. The states, in many instances, are too apt to insist upon their own jurisdiction when it suits their real or fancied interests, then fly to Washington for aid when the problem gets beyond their handling. The regulation of the railroads is an instance. Pure food, another. And, embodying the same principle, the recent cavortings of California. And it is also to be considered that some private interests hide behind

ferring the loose rein of one commonwealth to the accountable discipline of the nation. Many subsidiary issues of jurisdiction are yet to be fought out between the state and the nation. In the long run there is going to be what may be called a constructive division of power. The state will underwrite those functions it is able to discharge, and the others will be taken over by the nation. Efficiency will be the test. Roosevelt spoke as an Amerićan and not a partisan when he declared the states should be

warned that if they will not or cannot exert

the powers now resting in them, the federal

government will be compelled to take them

over for the benefit of the whole people.

#### A CALL ON ATLANTA HOMES.

One thousand young Georgia boys affiliated with the corn club movement in this state must be housed in Atlanta during the duration of the approaching corn show. To solve the problem, the chamber of commerce is making requisition upon the homes of Atlanta. The earlier the housewives of Atlanta phone the headquarters of the chamber and offer to entertain one, two or more boys the more quickly will arrangements be systematized and expedited.

It is doubtful if any movement with a more practical appeal ever was launched in Georgia. We are fond of protesting against the high cost of living and of stressing the desirability of keeping the boys on the farm. The boys' corn club movement is a shot at the center of both of these problems. It is also, and this is vitally important, distinct progress toward the encouragement of Georgia products, a subject to the forefront now in the minds of every thoughtful man These young Georgians are being taught

in their receptive years how to get the most out of the soil, how to make farming a fascinating business and rob it of drudgery; how, in a word, to become producers. The graduate from a boys' corn club is to be a future maker of wealth, his worth as an asset to the state enhanced many times. The practicability of the propaganda is already proved. It has increased corn production to the acre in Georgia, and it is one of the factors responsible for this year's bumper corn crop in the state. An important feature is that corn culture is the keystone of the doctrine of diversification, and diversification means keeping within the state millions of dollars now leaving it needlessly for the necessities of life.

All these fundamental facts will weigh with the housewives of Atlanta, in their attitude toward the corn show and the young men who are to exhibit at it. No higher industrial development is possible for Georgia unless the women actively co-operate. It will be found a pleasure to entertain these boys in the homes of Atlanta. They are bright, ambitious, well bred and appreciative. And in extending them hospitality the women of Atlanta will know they are forwarding a great constructive movement in Georgia.

#### Respect for Women.



#### ATLANTA KEEPING THE PEACE. - NO. 3.

By PHILIP WELTNER. Secretary Prison Association of Georgia.

Atlanta is a good town. It is a better



yet judging Atlanta by its percentage of murders, of arrests, it appears to the world as recking with corruption. Police Commissioner Waldo estimates the population of New York at 5,250,000. Chief Beavers, quoting from the city directory figures, gives Atlanta a popula-tion of 159,475. Waldo credits his department with 126,007 arrests, not counting juveniles; Beavers credits his force with 17,139. Look-

ing at these figures in the light of proportions, this means that in New York there is one arrest to forty-two inhabitants, while in Atlanta there is more than one to ten. New York and Atlanta.

Now, turning to the 1912 report of the city magistrates, page 69, we find that the leven police courts, in 1912, was \$169,231.50. The amount collected through Atlanta's po lice court, the same year, was \$83,298.30. In other words, in a city thirty-three times Atlanta's size the fines amounted to only twice as much. The total fines in 1903 and 1906, in New York, did not equal Atlanta's police court fines in 1912. A further examination of New York's report shows that its police courts enjoy an identical jurisdiction with Atlanta's, to wit: Over cases of disorderly conduct, intoxication, idling and loitering, violations corporation ordi nances, violations city sanitary laws, cruelty to animals, and speeding and other violations of the highway law. Except in two of these classes, cruelty to animals and highway violations, did the fines ever exceed

These are just plain facts. The answer cannot be that New York is a more orderly community than Atlanta, and hence occasions less arrests and higher fines. And in previous articles the figures quoted prove that the reason is neither the negro, nor prohibition, nor the vice crusade. Whatever standing, namely, the absence of any standard, by which the man on the beat may know when he is expected to make an arrest and when not. He is left to his individual blas in no other matter, but subjected to a dis-cipline that leaves him but a single choice in the performance of his duty. The general rule to make an arrest, whenever there is reason to believe a given individual has violated the state law or a municipal ordinance, is too general to be worth much in practical affairs. If this were enforced strictly Atlanta would be one big calaboose Nearly all men fall short of the letter of the law. Should all men be arrested and arraigned as criminals?

To Keep the Peace.

The business of the police is to keep the Their vested authority to make arrests is incidental to that purpose. Its ex-

ercise is not an end, but simply a means.

Atlanta needs an inquiry office as part of its police establishment. There is no limit to the possibilities of its usefulness, but one thing it can do, and that is to standardize the question of arrests, to give uni-formity to the exercise of this power. When that is accomplished, the police will be free to give more time to the apprehension of more serious offenders and the police court will be at liberty to examine more thoroughly into cases brought before it.

With the lessening of arrests, the tremendous pressure under which the recorder works will be relieved and the individual will stand forth, with his merits and demerits clearly marked out, each to receive more nearly what each is due.

#### Romance and Drama Of Georgia's Great Seal

Editor Constitution Many inquiries have come to the executive office regarding the history of the great sear of the state of Georgia.

I am unable at the moment to put my hand on any document giving the history of the great seal in detail. However, I once made a study of the subject and will state what I recall from memory:

The present great seal was adopted in 1799, concurrent with the constitution of that ear. Before that year we had several great seals, one, I believe, during the Colonial period, another during the revolution and another between the recognition of the state by Great Britain and the constitution of The figures on one side of the seal. that is the one not constituting the coat of arms, I believe, came down in the main from the Colonial seal and were designed by General Oglethorpe and his associates. might be interesting to note that one of them refers to the silk industry which the founders of the colory hoped to—and did to some extent—develop. The coat of arms, in part, if not wholly, were adopted in 1799. There has been some dispute among historians as to when the present seal was adopted, and as to why the figures 1799 appear thereon. But this to my mind was cleared up recently when Governor Brown found among the possessions left by his brother, Julius Brown, copy of an old newspaper published at Louisville, Ga., bearing the date of that year, in which there appears an advertisement calling for designs for a great seal.

No Change Since 1790. The seal has undergone no change since 1799, and, I believe, though as to this I am certain, even the same physical seal, made of silver, is still in use. It is a pend ant and has to be done in wax, the only one of that character, so far as now used by any of the states. It is badly worn and the impressions made from it are

The great seal has been through a great deal of history. Perhaps the most conspicuous incident happened during the reconstruc tion era, when Secretary of State Barnett refused to recognize the reconstruction government and fled with it. The story is told that it was buried in a hog pen on the Barnett farm and remained there until an elective government was established. My recollection is, however, that the secretary of state's seal was so hidden, and that Barnett took the great seal out of the country with

If more detailed information should be desired, it can be obtained from L. L. Knight, compiler of records, whose office is at the capitol. He is out of the city for the present, or I would have conferred with him before writing this. A. H. ULM, Secretary Executive Department, State Georgia.

Smith, a gentleman tory of the neighborhood who had undertaken for Arnold the business of communicating with the English ship which was to convey Andre safely back to New York, and which lay off the shore in the Hudson.

While Andre and Smith were breakfast. ing, they saw that this vessel was being fired on from Croton Point, and as soon as she could get under way she dropped several miles down the river. Smith professed to be unable to supply rowers to take Andre such a distance and Arnold arranged with him to guide the British officer by back

With thirty-five men in the field to assist him, Game Warden Will V. Zimmer, of this county, is determined to see to it that the law is enforced to the see to it that the law is enforced to the letter. He not only requires hunters to have hunting licenses, but also written permission from the owner of the land on which they are hunting.

There were five cases made by Mr. Zimmer and A. E. Binder, one of his deputies, Thursday against hunters who had no license to hunt. Two cases were noted against so were worked against sportsmen who were were made against sportsmen who were hunting on land without the permis-sion of the owner.

RESULTS OF THE TESTS

OF GRADES OF COTTON Washington, November 20—The department of agriculture today announced the results of tests as to the waste, tensile strength and bleaching qualities of the various grades of cot-About 120 bales were used in the experiments, ten or twelve of each grade The two classes of cotton, western upland and Atlantic states upland, yielded a visible waste of slightly different weight and character, the average difference in waste being slightly less from that of the Atlantic states upland The statement from the department said

The differences are considerably greater in the lower grades than in the higher grades

"The value of the visible waste from the various grades has yet to be determined, but from its character there can be little doubt that the valuation figures for the waste of the two classes of cotton will be approximately equal, weight for weight As regards the relative amount of visible waste in the different grades, the figures are found to be more consistent than might have been expected The mill waste in experiments to date values from about 4 per cent in middling fair, to about 11 per cent in good ordinary, and it is satisfactory to note that the various official grades fall into line in this respect with something approaching mathematical uniformity.

Although these figures are the results of experiments of only one season's cotton, they are presented with confidence in their approximate accuracy so far as they go."






