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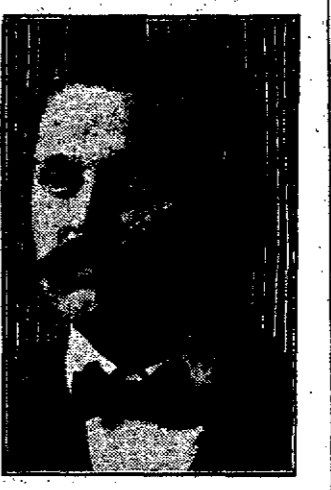

DECLINE IS REPORTED IN COTTON CONDITION

Average Deterioration of 4.3 Points Is Indicated by The Journal of Commerce.

New York, September 30.—(Special.) The condition of cotton, as compiled from nearly 1,900 replies of special correspondents of the Journal of Commerce, bearing an average date of September 28, is 67.1 per cent, compared with 71.4 per cent a month ago, or 1911, 68.7 in 1910 and 59.5 in 1909. The average decline for the same period is 5.3 points. Deterioration occurred in all states, but was most severe in Alabama, Arkansas, Tennessee, Missouri and Oklahoma all of which lost 10 points and over. Texas, nearly held its own, losing only 0.5 point. Details by states:

Tracks Barricaded and Trains Shot Up in the Copper Region.

Calumet, Mich., September 30.—Shots fired in two attacks upon strike-breakers and numerous fights between union and non-union miners marked the copper mine strike today. A special car with thirty men from a New York detective agency brought here by the Ammeek Mining company, to assist in breaking the strike, was attacked presumably by strikers when it arrived before dawn. A number of shots were fired at the car and the fire was returned. The car windows were broken, but no one was hurt. When a barricade across the tracks prevented the car from reaching the mine, it was brought back to Calumet.

CAVALRY REGIMENTS MOVE ON WASHINGTON

Winchester, Va., September 30.—Historic Shenandoah valley witnessed scenes today which recalled war days as a line of cavalrymen, fully three miles long, riding two abreast, wended their way over the country roads starting on their long march across country to Washington. The troopers, comprising the Tenth, Eleventh and Fifteenth regiments of United States cavalry, had been in camp near here for several months working out war problems in accordance with a program of the general staff of the army. Mexico Is Shown Atlanta By Exhibit in City Today

Mexico, with its wonderful mineral resources, its pottery work, its colorful, but without its ever-present revolutions, is on exhibit in Atlanta today. "Seeing Mexico" is a car on the tracks in front of the Kimball house and near the old depot, offers a wondrous insight into the peculiarities and customs of the citizens of the republic across the Rio Grande.

The car, which is on a five-year tour of the United States, was fitted out under Madero's administration, and just before the president was forced to give up his post. It is being conducted under the auspices of the Mexican National Educational society, and the Mexican National railways, and is intended to show to Americans some of the products and wonders of the neighboring country.

Archaeological specimens, dug from under Mexico City by William Nevin, a famous mineralogist, and going back to Aztec days, make part of the exhibit. Specimens of the handwork of modern day Mexicans and Mexican Indians are included, and some of the pottery and bead work is decidedly pretty and interesting. There are also a number of souvenirs of war time in the troubled republic.

A small charge is required as an entrance fee, and the car is open from 10 o'clock each day until that hour at night. It is due to remain here until next Wednesday.

Arrangements are being made so that the school children can be taken through by classes and shown the exhibit.

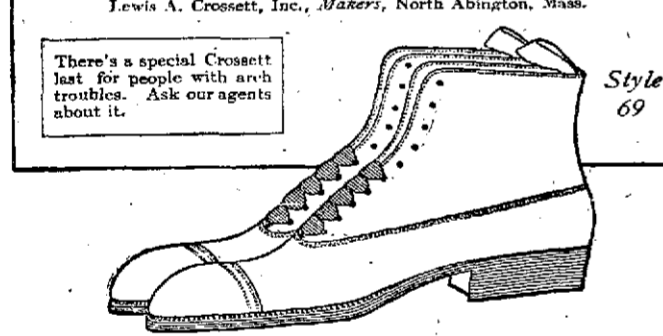

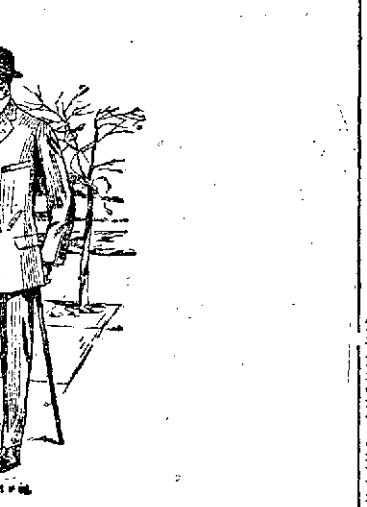

DID INDIAN GIRL LEAD LEWIS AND CLARK?
The most hazardous and the most significant journey ever made on the western continent—a journey that rivals in daring and exceeds in importance the expeditions of Stanley and Livingstone in the wilds of Africa—a journey that resulted in the greatest real estate transaction ever recorded in history and gave to the world riches beyond comprehension, was the Lewis and Clark expedition in 1804.

The Lewis and Clark expedition was naturally full of hardships, and Lewis and Clark were engaged for more than a year and a half encompassing the wilderness before they finally saw the blue line in the western horizon which told them that the end of their journey was at hand and that they had crossed the continent from Missouri to the Pacific.
The stories of the adventures of Lewis and Clark have filled volumes, but the romance of the march has been heightened by the tale that an Indian girl led the party and that without her assistance they could hardly have succeeded. The name of this Indian girl, it has been discovered of recent years, was Sacajawea, but in the journals kept by the explorers little attention is paid to the part she played in the success of the expedition. Only lately different states in the west have started movements to honor this woman by the erection of monuments.

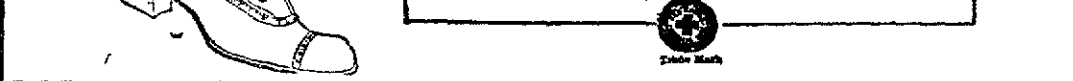

SECOND EXTRA SESSION CALLED FOR TENNESSEE

Gov. Hooper Is Resolved to Get Prohibition Law Enforcement Measure Through.

Nashville Tenn September 30—In a proclamation issued today by Gov. Erner B. Hooper, the announcement is made that the legislature will be convened on October 13 in second extra session to consider the prohibition law enforcement bills killed by the filibuster in the house last week. The proclamation says: "In the light for the enforcement of the law in this state I desire to appeal directly to the great masses of our citizenship for support and cooperation in the development of the last few weeks have demonstrated to my mind that an overwhelming majority of the people, regardless of political affiliation, are determined to put an end to the open, flagrant and disgraceful nullification of the law in the cities of the state, knowing the existence of this wholesome sentiment I call upon the people for its public expression throughout the length and breadth of Tennessee. The question which now confronts the people is, shall the laws of the state be enforced in the city as well as in the country or shall the out-lawed saloons corruptly dominate not only the cities but the legislature and the entire state. Therefore, appeal to the people of every county in the state to rise above the narrow confines of partisan limitation, to assemble at the county seats and endorse by their votes, to instruct, encourage and support both the governor and the general assembly in the restoration of the majesty of the law."

\$95,000 DIVIDENDS PAID WEDNESDAY BY SIX LAGRANGE MILLS

LaGrange Ga September 30—(Special)—Five of the Lagrange Cotton Mills paid this morning their semi-annual dividend which will amount in total to \$88,957, and an additional \$6,000 having just been paid by an affiliated cotton warehouse, makes the total \$94,957. The proceeds making payment of the dividends are as follows: Dunson mills \$20,000 Manchester mills, 20,000; H. C. Williams mills, \$18,957; H. J. Mills, \$17,549; Milledale mills \$12,000; Security warehouse, \$6,000. Total, \$94,957. This leaves three mills yet to declare dividends, namely, Dixie mills, LaGrange mills and the Park mill. All of these mills will declare dividends a little later. This dividend coming just at the time a hen tonic epidemic is abroad bringing a high price has put a jubilant spirit in the hearts of every citizen and business man. This is the second annual dividend of the mills this year, the first having been paid in April and of about the same amount.

RACE SEGREGATION WANTED IN MARYLAND

Baltimore Md September 30—In accordance with a resolution adopted at a mass meeting last night of residents of Baltimore county to protest against the location in the suburbs of Mount Washington College, a negro institution the next session of the Maryland legislature will be asked to pass a segregation law for the metropolitan belt of Baltimore county identical in principle with the segregation ordinance of Baltimore city. According to the plan decided on, the county is to be divided into plots, corresponding to city blocks, to segregate purposes and the same rules of occupancy applied to them as is now applied to city blocks, thus an entire plot will be occupied by members of only one race. The report of a committee appointed to confer with the trustees of Morgan college stated the trustees had been given to understand that the residents of Mount Washington and vicinity were incensed at the threatened negro invasion and that no matter what proposals were made for the selection of a site at Mount Washington would arouse indignation and resentment. The trustees it is said have given assurance that no purchase of a site had been made, or a gift of such a site accepted.

RIGHT OF PRESIDENT QUESTIONED BY COURT

Denver Colo September 30—The United States circuit court of appeals for the eighth district, with the United States supreme court for a ruling on the question of the right of a president to withdraw public lands from entry. The announcement was made today by Presiding Judge William C. Hook. This request is made in the Mid-West Oil company case before the court of appeals for the eighth district. It involves the ownership of oil lands in Wyoming. In making his announcement Judge Hook stated that the court had determined on this course because of the important issues involved. Upon the final determination of a president's right to withdraw public lands is said to hinge the ownership of extensive tracts of oil lands. The outcome of the present case is expected also to have an important bearing on litigation involving public lands in other states.

BEEF CATTLE HERDS FOR INDIAN TRIBES

Washington September 30—The latest effort of the government to check the present scarcity of beef on its part to raise cattle for the market was not only a Commission of Indian Affairs Sells stocking the big Indian reservations with large herds of fine breeds of beef cattle to improve and develop all of the live stock of the Indians. In many instances the Indian herds show considerable aptitude for handling live stock, and in order to encourage him the commissioner has authorized the purchase out of Indian funds of beef cattle herds for a number of reservations. Commissioner Sells has issued advertisements calling for bids on a 9,000 head of cattle for the Crow Indian reservation in Montana. The intention is to increase the stock of sheep on the reservations in Arizona and New Mexico.

HIGHER ATLANTA RATES BARRED BY COMMISSION

Washington September 30—Advances ranging from 4 to 7 cents per 100 pounds in class and commodity freight rates from Richmond, Norfolk, Lynchburg, Roanoke and other points taking "Virginia cities" rates to Vicksburg, Miss. Montgomery Ala. Mason, West Point and Atlanta, Ga. and other destinations in the south, today were suspended by the interstate commerce commission until January 31 next. The commission will institute an inquiry into the proposed rates.

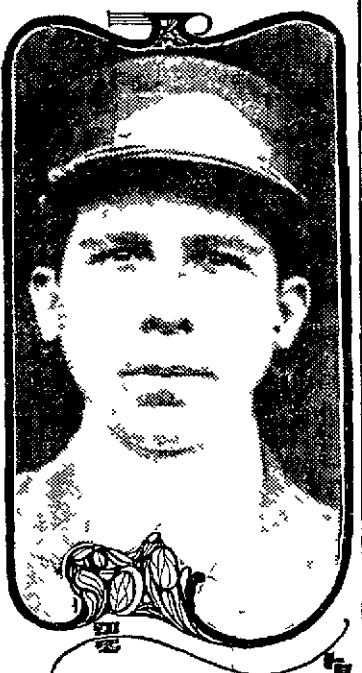

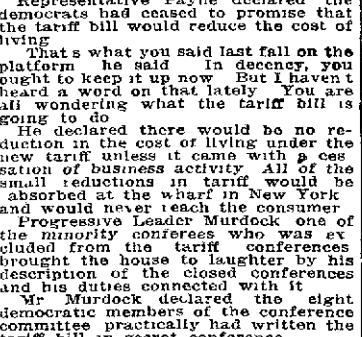
