THE REMARKABLE DIARY OF MRS. LIVINGSTON MIMS

Being the notations made by her of those things worth more than passing notice, giving an intimate study of the south, throwing interesting sidelights of the men and women of prominence in the days of the south's re-making. Diary edited for publication by Miss Isma Dooly.

The first installment of the diary of the late Mrs. Livingston Mims. of Atlanta, is published today, the date of the first notation being June 25, 1876, in Savannah. Ga. Mrs. Mims was a Miss Harper, of Brandon, Miss., a woman of striking beauty and social prominence. She married Major Mims in 1866. He was a planter, scholar, and served in the legislature of Mississippi, re-signing to enter the confederate army, becoming a member of the staff of General Joseph Johnston. He rendered gallant service to the cause, and at the close of the war entered the insurance business as partner with General Johnston. They were living in Savannah, Ga., leaders in social life there, when Mrs. Mims makes the first notes in her remarkable diary. These are supplemented frequently by Major Mims. Both were people of literary talents and artistic tastes, the marked people of their time, in public life, in interature, and in society. Following a close personal study of the Bible, Mrs. Mims became, a pupil of the first classes organized by the Christian Science advocates, and a disciple of the teachings of Mrs. Mary Baker Eddy. She organized the first followers of Christian Science in Atlanta, Mrs. Mims conducting the dedicatory exercises. She became a member of the faculty of the College of Metaphysics organized by Christian Science. As near as possible the exact notes made by Mrs. Mims are reproduced as she made them. In order to distinguish what she wrote from the sup-plementary notes made by Major Mims, hers are signed "S. M.," and his "L. M."

I am impressed with 'Taine's remark about Pecksniff, "that in France Pecksniff would be impossible, since "the modern Frenchman affects vice instead of, virtue.' "

He told me that Sherman, with his advantage of position when he, Johnston, was at Dalton, and with superiority of numbers, should have inflicted damages on his (Johnston's) army, and prevented the retreat he made. Feeling Sherman's incapacity to avail himself of the natural advantages in his behalf, he was confident in his retrogressive move ment. Sherman, seeing that he did not properly avail himself of these advantages, and with his disposition to always throw blame on others, tried to place stance on the gallant McPherson (now dead, and unable to answer for himself). Sherman charges that McPherson did not properly conduct the movement against Johnston. Boynton, in his review of Sherman's book, assails Sherman for his defeat, and defends McPherson. Johnston conducted his retreat in such maner as to win general commendation from both sides, and has told me, he felt when he had cross on the Chattahoochee with Atlanta well fortified in his rear, their fortunes were reversed. His were the rdvanteges, and Sherman's the disadvantages. Johnston says he is confident he would have gained a great victory over him but for his removal from command. General Johnston always assert ed that by the confederate law giving rank to officers of old United States army, who were in our Contederate army, he ranked all others. His rank in the United States army was brigadier general. He said had he been brought in contact with Lee he would not have obeyed his order, but made and insisted on his seniority. When General Lee in the end was made generalissimo of our armies, the question was settled against General Johnston. This day has been celebrated by

SOCIAL CENTERS.

In her effort to make the country chool a social center, Miss Margaret Woodrow Wilson, daughter of the president, has hit upon a thoroughly sound and proven idea. Miss Wilson interrupted a civic improvement in Washington recently, long enough to declare "the social center movement in the final analysis is the fundamental principle of democracy."

The president's daughter is right. Since common school education became an accepted part of the life of this country, the "little red schoolhouse" has been a synonym for democracy, democracy of the sort that founds a mutual bond between people and a mutual meeting ground.

With the complications of an advancing civilization, the multiplication of wealth and the creation of new classes and semiclasses, we have lost sight of the intrinsic value of the "little red schoolhouse" as a common denominator of the essentially similar activities of people giving over to agricultural pursuits. We need to revive the interest in this humble institution and, as they do in France, Germany and England. employ the school as a rallying-point for the forces of civic endeavor.

To a certain and very large extent, the church supplies a place where people of all classes and modes of thought may gather as a clearinghouse of energy and experience, and a merger of effort for the general welfare. But the church, at the last analysis, is essentially religious and denominational. What is needed is a forum where the inevitable differences of creed may not obtrude to deflect the minds of men and women from the one channel of determination to better the life and standing of their communities, gauging that duty from a civic and not a sectarian point of view.

If in Georgia, for example, each schoolhouse in each school district were made a common center for public meetings, held not when great crisis made meeting necessary, but at stipulated intervals, it is difficult to estimate the influence created for general intellectual and material advancement.

The Georgia state agricultural society and other organizations have at various times earnestly advanced this idea. Every effort they put forth in the direction of making it a reality, will mean progress toward the solution of the economic, social and moral problems that are the common in heritance. Incidentally, they will create throughout the country districts a finer cooperation and an increasing neighborliness.

A MENACE TO SOCIETY,

Recent dispatches from Chicago, Ill., and Helena, Montana, indicate that what America needs as well as a uniform divorce law. is a uniform marriage law. In Chicago, the validity of several thousand marriages is brought into dispute because of a doubt as to the legal status of justices of the peace. In Montana, erroneous interpretations placed on the peculiar marriage and divorce laws of the state, pave the way to similar embarrassments.

It does look that differ as the states may about corporation control and economic questions, they would take no chance in trifling with marriage, the fundamental institution and foundation of society. Yet there are almost as many marriage laws in America as there are commonwealths, and if a strict fechnical interpretation of state rights is observed, it is easily possuble for a couple legally married in one state to live together in violation of law in another. The consequent menace to the children born of such unions need not be elaborated.

The "house of governors" in its several sessions has done something to co-ordinate sentiment for clarifying this intolerable sit uation. But if ever there was a problem justifying the strong arm and clear intelligence of the federal government, it is this one that touches the safety of society and the sancity of the home.



In these varied occupations his name became famous at the time, and has ever since remained a synenym for villainy

He was a buckle-maker by trade, but a thief by profession He went to London as a young man and hied a life of dissipation which quickly landed him in prison for debt. He remained there for four years and became acquanced with a number of the worst chalacters of London When he emerged from jail, and with the knowledge he gained there, he drew about him a number of crooks and started in the business of the vold receive the stolen goods.
