SHERIFF SMITH ASKED FOR 200 STATE TROOPS

Governor Invokes Statute of 1911 in Order to Avert Possible Mob Violence and to Save State Great Expense

There will be a change of venue in the case of the three Jefferson county negroes, confined in the Tower here, for the murder of Mrs. Seth Irby. That conclusion reached yesterda by Judge Ben Rawlins, of the Jeffer-son superior court, after the sheriff had called on the governor for troops and after a number of telegrams had passed between the governor and the judge.

Sheriff Smith declared that the thre Regreces, William and George Hart and Robert Paschal, would unquestionably be lynched if they were brought to Jefferson county without the protoc-tion of troops. So greatly outraged were the people over the crime, he said that citizens were gathering from the five surrounding counties to lynch the

five surrounding counties to lynch the men as soon as they should be brought to Louisville. It would take at least 200 armed men to protect them if they should be brought there. THE BLACK MAN'S BURDEN

IS THE WHITE MAN'S PERIL. Dr Charles Wardell Stiles, of the public health service, speaks in naked and wholesome terms of the mutual health menace the black and the white races hold to each other

Whatever may be said as to the virtues, per se, of segregation, it can at best be viewed as only a dubious palliative of the health situation, if, indeed, segregation of the negro would not itself vastly increase the danger to the white man Dr Stiles himself points the reason and confirms the reiterated contentions of The Constitution in the following sentences from his address

the ionowing sentences from his address in fairness to the white mother let us recall that her servants, including her childrens nurses return to these the infectious diseases that lurk there negro homes at night are subject to are liable to bring these infections to he white homes in which they work during the day are liable to spread the maladies throng the white families and thus to place upon the white mother additional but unnecessary cares and sorrows due to preventable sickness and death in her family

In other words, what would we accom plish if we succeeded in segregating every negro man, woman and child in a single ward and built around it a wall ten feet high?

We would accomplish less than nothing unless with that segregation went an en forcement in this isolated district of such rigid sanitary and hygienic laws and ordi nances as Atlanta is not now enforcing in one of the scattered negro districts of the city

why?

Because from that segregated district negro nurses would still emerge from dis eased homes to come into our homes and hold our children in their arms negro cooks would still bring bacilli from the segregated district into the homes of the poor and the rich white Atlantan, negro chauffeurs negro butlers negro laborers would come from within the pale and scatter disease with the same old ignorant lavish hess, into that district would go the clothes of white families to be laundered in environ ments possibly reeking with filth and disease

We are not discussing the merits or de ments of segregation for other racial prob lems We do know if it is hoped thus to choke off the stream of disease which one race is pouring into another the hope is vain

There is even the certainty that segrega tion unaided would increase the peril of the black man to the white. As it now is the scattored negro districts are hedged in by white communities the very presence of which imposes a measurable restraint and an influence for improvement

Remove this restraint and influence sub stituting for it nothing else, and it is not a work of imagination to picture the segre gated district becoming a "reservoir of dis ease beside which present conditions are idy line

Here is the core of the business, and it is what the people of Atlanta and every com munity with a negro population need to learn

The disease germ knows no color or race line no class distinction and has little re spect for distance when it can fasten on a human carrier To purge the negro of dis ease is not so much a kindness to the negro himself as it is a matter of sheer self preser vation to the white man Philanthropy doesn + enter into this battle of life and death grim primitive self interest the con servation of the health of the white race is the controlling factor We can t evade that unless we accept the consequences fact We can't segregate the negro and e-cape his diseases unless we deport hum And that is, of course an impossibility

Arthur Wil-hume general inspector of the plants spoke of it yesterday as one of the most important inventions in many years The apparatus known as a wet cleaner is simple in construction and operation.
