# Boys Flying Kite Make Atlanta Dark For Many Minutes

Station Burn Out When Big Flyer Pulls Down the Wires Near School.

Boys flying a big cord kite with a long tail and cutters on the end of it, put Atlanta in darkness for more than forty minutes yesterday afternoon and threatened to the up traffic.

It was between 3 30 and 4 30 o clock when the lights went out Investigation by inspectors of the Georgia Rail way and Power company showed that the switches at the Ashby street station were burned out possibly because of the extra heavy load thrown on them when the kite pulled down wires in the neighborhood of the Davis street school.

With the switches of the Ashby street station in trouble the side bat teries at the Alabama street station became overloaded and put the down town section of the city in darkness. Within fifteen minutes after the trouble started linemen located the break and within thirty minutes the entire affected area was repaired at no time during the evening was car traffic impeded.



New York March 11—While Henry Stegel head of department stores in New York Chicago and Boston was testifying today in a riotous bank 11-tow hearing the grand jury that has been investigating the failure of the Siegel stores in New York and the savings bank conducted in connection with them returned three joint indict ments against buin and his pattner in the banking enterprise Frank 1 Nog 1 Stegel and Nogel were at aloned on \$21-000 bail each.

Three hundred angri depositors who had been forcibly ejected from the bankruptcy hearing hunted around the federal building for beigel in Nam At the time they were looking for him he and his banking partner were standing before Judge Rosalsky pleading not guilty to the indictments. One indictment charges Siegel and Nogel with grand larceny in that they made false statements to the Bank of Commerce in order to borrow \$25.000. 



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

### AS TO COTTON CONTRACTS.

It is reported that the present session of congress will make the stock, cotton and produce exchanges "be good" or get out of business. A multiplicity of bills have been introduced on the subject and strong pressure is being brought to bear on the committees having to do with these bills.

In this connection, it is significant that the United States court of appeals has just handed down a decision which gives to the principle of speculation involved in future contracts the sanction of law

Courts, of course, deal with technical points of law and are not assumed to arbitrate the morals of the abstract ethics of the case. That very fact furnishes an additional argument why congress should so trame its pending legislation as to assure that all exchanges shall observe a "fair and honest contract system."

"It may be said that a trader goes into the exchange with his eyes open, knowing just exactly in what manner the cards are stacked, and that the old and cynical adage of "caveat emptor" should apply. If the transactions of the New York cotton and other produce exchanges affected merely the gamblers not unwilling to "welch" on their contracts, that would be a different matter. But when it is considered that the unfair form of contract is only a lever for enabling the exchange to juggle prices a thousand miles away, then the matter becomes obviously one of national and congressional business.

No one objects to any exchange so long as it confines its operations to their legitimate sphere, which is conformance with the laws of supply and demand and bona fide

Hedging is a legitimate part of the cotton trade. Deprive the mills and the legitimate dealers of the opportunity to hedge and their business really becomes a gamble. Put all the exchanges out of business, and you expose the farmer to the mercies of foreign exchanges dominated by foreign and unsympathetic interests.

But the producer, the consumer and the trader have long enough tolerated the "short change" game of certain exchanges. If there is any guile in the matter of reform. the next demand for relief may have dynamite behind it.

## PIRATICAL PATENT LAWS.

The United States court of appeals of New York has just handed down a decision illustrating the cruel and absolute piracy of our antiquated patent laws. An inventor early in his career brought suit against a company that sought to infringe his patents. The company, with millions at its back and the ablest attorneys at its disposal, has delayed adjudication all these years.

Thirteen years ago the inventor died, a poor man. Today, the court upholds his ciaims, which mean millions to his heirs, if he has anv.

The case is not an isolated one. Our patent laws are a crazy jumble of contradictions, full of loopholes for corporations able to command legal talent to find them, full of pitfalls for the litigant whose sole resource is generally the product of his

This single incident shows that the old cynical adage, the "battle is to the strong," tails in the long run. Here the weak man won, though it took him years and impovwishment to win, and death overtook him

before victory came his way.

thing is unfair and unethical. The average man's chief capital is his brain. He should be given a fair return on its product for at least a term of years. That was the original, or at least the ostensible, intent of the patent laws. But under constant congressional amendment and a maze of departmental rulings and contradictory court procedure, the poor man has lost out in the shuffle, and the rich man has, as is too often the case before the courts, been given

## A BILLION-DOLLAR LIFT.

dollars is waiting to promote national prosperity.

That is the substance of an analysis of the financial needs of the railroads made by Richard H. Edmonds in a recent issue

Mr. Edmonds speaks with the force of authority when he says that, in round numbers, one billion dollars will be required to equip American railroads for the tasks of the present and the immediate future.

As an encouraging text for his analysis, Mr. Edwards takes the ease with which the Southern railway recently disposed of \$10,000,000 worth of three-year 5 per cent notes for purposes of emergent improvement.' The issue was handled by J. P. Morgan & Co., and was literally "gobbled

up" by representative financial interests. As Mr. Edmonds shows, it would have been practically impossible three or four months ago to have launched even this

comparatively modest and gilt-edged loan. At that time, the world of business was uncertain as to how the banks would accept the currency law.

Vague distrust of the administration's trust and railroad program still whistled "down brakes" to an extent,

Today, these influences are lifting.

It is true that the interstate commerce commission has yet to settle the critical request of the eastern railroads for authority to make a nominal increase in their tariffs.

But the feeling is general that the verdict will be favorable, since the railroads have shown a disposition to abandon the old piratical high financiering so largely accounting for the former distrust of them.

Mr. Edmonds shows with particular sigmificance that more than \$30,000,000 of the large loan funds needed will be immediately expended in the south. That is, on course, exclusive of other and even fartherreaching improvements the southern railroads cannot much longer postpone without endangering their standing as sheer business properties.

The decision by the interstate commerce commission will, of course, be the signal for the loosening of a billion dollars into every channel of activity in America.

What that will mean as a stimulus to universal prosperity is difficult of estimate. With other industrial and commercial

portents of a healthy nature, the year 1914 should be one of the most progressive in American history.

## A BEDROCK ARGUMENT.

One need not have agreed with all the arguments for woman's suffrage Jane Addams, of Chicago, put forth in Atlanta last night to recognize in her one of the very great women of the country.

### GEORGIA'S WATER **POWER DEVELOPMENT** W. M'CALLIE, State Geologist.

Editor Constitution: The development of Georgia's water powers in the last decade has been phenomenal. Prior to 1903, or ten years ago, the only water power development withago, the only water power development within the limits of the state, which could be considered at all in the class with recent developments, was that of the Augusta canal. For
more than a quarter of a century this water
power held the unique position of being the
most extensive water power development in
the southern states. The early completion of
this canal, which was a municipal undertaking of no mean proportion for its time, at
once placed the city of Augusta in a position
to offer attractive inducements to manutacto offer attractive inducements to manufac-turers in the form of cheap power, a finan-cial consideration which has been the means of making Augusta one of our most im-portant manufacturing centers, and has won for that city the appropriate title "The Low-ell of the South."

ell of the South."

Other carly developments which may here be referred to as furnishing rather large powers are those at Columbus; but these, like the Augusta canal power, are now so far overshadowed by the magnitude of some of our recent hydro-electrical developments that they have become of only minor importance.

The following tabulated data collected by the writer since the first of January, during personal visits to the individual plants mentioned, gives the developed and ultimate development in horse-power of all of the main water power plants at present in the state:

In other words, Georga's water power plants are at present producing less than three-fifths the power for which they were constructed; or, to state it differently, these water power plants as now developed can be increased by the installation of additional units in the present plants more than one and one-half times. This additional installation, which in many cases will be comparatively inexpensive, will, no doubt, be made from time to time as the demand for power increases, so that within the next decade, or possibly in a much shorter interval, all of the plants will be fully installed and be producing all the power for which they were originally designed.

The smaller developed water powers of the state have not been included in the above estimates on account of the great difficulty in securing reliable data. Had these powers been included the above total present developed water powers would be inreased by possibly as much as ten thousand

horse-power.

This would give the present water-wheel capacity of all the plants now operated 191,-774 horse-power. Comparing these figures with unpublished data recently compiled by Mr. B. M. Hall, formerly a member of the hydrographic division of the United States Geological Survey, who estimates the total wheel installation water powers of the state at 1,223,600 horse-power, we find that our present developed powers are only about 14 per cent of our total water power.

## Americans Raise Price of Beef.

At present it appears that the American packers are operating independently and in competition with the English and Argentine concerns. They are also doing more busicompetition with the English and Argentine concerns. They are also doing more business, as the other plants operate only about a third of the time, while the Americans are going at full capacity. The Americans pay more for beeves and have been selling their products for what they can get. This method may in the end force such a combination in Argentina as was brought about in this country. The American packers have been supplying Argentine beef to their customers in England. They operate a line of meat markets in that country, and with the facilities they have at hand, and the control they have in the United States, it is possible for them to force the English and Argentine packers into an agreement as to the production and sale of South American beef.

The Americans had any agreement with their rivals in the matter of apportionment of trade, but they did not agree in the maiter of fixing prices for beeves and meat. As a result the price of catfle on the hopf has been greatly increased. Steers weighing \$20 pounds, which formerly sold for about \$75 a head. The prices before the Americans went to Argentine ranged from \$25 to \$44 a head. The ligher prices have made the Americans popular with the cattle-raisers, whose confidence they have gained, and in spite of the apportionment agreement the Americans have the pick of the stock and a constant supply for their plants. As they undersell the dressed meat in the European markets,

supply for their plants. As they undersell the dressed meat in the European markets, they are far from popular with the English and Argentine packers.


