Greenville, S. C., May 22.—George W. Tidwell, Sr., a traveling salesman, to-day was found guilty of manslaughter by a jury here today as a result of the shooting and killing of R. Emmett Walker, paymaster of a local cotton mill, and prominent socially.

Temporary insanity, caused by the discovery of alleged improper relations between the dead young manand his daughter, was the defense of Tidwell. Immediately after the verdict was returned, counsel for the convicted man asked for a new trial, and arguments will be heard on the motion in circuit court here tomorrow.

Sentence will not be levied until the hearing.

Walker was shot to death in the entrance of his office on March 12 last, his prominent connections, both socially and in business life, caused unsual interest to be manifested in the trial of Tidwell.

CARRANZA, THE SPHINX.

To all practical purposes, Huerta al ready is eliminated. Whether he retires voluntarily or by force his teeth have been drawn The real key to the settlement of the Mexican situation by peace rather than arms is Carranza And Carranza is as much sphinx as key

Carranza is reputed to be the executive and diplomatic brains of the revolution now nearing a successful conclusion

Just what proportion of credit to allot to Villa 18 as yet a matter of specula tion since best observers are not in agreement The more reliable experts agree that without Carranza Villa could have done nothing and that without Villa' Carranza would still be waging obscure guerrilla warfare in one of the remote Mexican states

This opinion takes cognizance of the fact that the task of keeping together the jar ring and antithetical elements among the constitutionalists and the task of welding ragitag irregulars and former bandits into an effective lighting machine call for two separate types of ability

& Carranza it is claimed has a wonderful knowledge of the composite Mexican char acter as well as of national problems It is he according to this viewpoint, that has ironed out differences and engineered the deals that kept the troops supplied with munitions and supplies. Villa self-educated and barbarous in instinct knows the peon soldier from the ground up has a native military genius of high order and personal hatreds urging him to the top of his strength

These hypotheses come nearer explaining than any other why one man sits back safe near the American border and calmly issue: orders to the other one who is bearing the brunt of things at the front They do not afford us very much light on Carranza, as to his probable attitude in the coming crisis Within a few days weeks at the outside. Carranza will be in position to dictate terms to all Mexico. Is he equipped to formulate a program that will look to the solution of the agraman, educational and administrative problems that underlie the whole revolution? Will he accept the co-operation of our country or will be resent and resist it as gratuitous interference?

Baftling the situation still is fascinating At each fresh turn the wisdom of President Wilson's deliberate methods is newly vindicated

TWO MASTERS OF THE ART

Which is the better public ty expert-Roosevelt or Wilson? The query is pertinent by reason of the Colonel's return to the first page and tv reason of Mr Wilson's somewhat unusual course for a presidential incuribent in being interviewed by a mag azire on a critical current topic Sam Blythe has in The Saturday Evening Post of this week an illuminating conversation with the president on the Mexican atua

Our estimate is that as between the two men Wilson is by far the more effective master of publicity and that is taking into account the now conceded fact that pub licity is a legitimate and imperative factor in politics and statesmanship

As a master of publicity, Roosevelt often creates about as much friction as he does conviction He appeals to emotion rather than to reason and is apt to try to make the spectacular element do duty also for solid argument

Wilson has neither of these traits. He knows just as much as does Roosevelt administration.

about the proper values of publicity, as to time and place. He knows the value of employing the unusual. He has shown that, at every turn, from the reading of his messages to his remarkable self-revelation before the National Press club. He is thorough master of whatever subject he discusses His method is persuasive rather than explosive His idea appears to be to convince rather than to rub the wrong way. Come back at him, and he does not lose his temper, and if he does show the slightest symptoms of heat it does not impair the clearness of his faculties. He is not unmindful of the spectacular, but he uses it rather as a servant and adjunct than as the end itself

The two reach the public by different methods, but both certainly are masters of the art of knowing how to get the public ear

UNDOING A BLUNDER.

The diplomatic and consular appropria tion bill, just passed by the house makes provision for the purchase of embassy and legation grounds and buildings in several foreign countries. The chief criticism is that money is not supplied to decently house all our more important foreign rep

It has for many years been a reproach to the dignity of the American government that it should compel the men who repre sent its authority abroad to supply them selves with dwellings and official quarters or to live in the slovenly style. The custom would have been bad enough if it stopped here. But by neglecting to vote our diplomats maintenance accounts com mensurate with the importance of their offices we made it necessary to almost exclusively confine our diplomatic repre sentation to rich men

The condition spring up of course originally out of our extreme democratic ideas the reasoning being that the great est republic on earth should not affect gaudy trappings in rivalry with old world rovalty. That theory was well enough so long as America occupied a backwoods no sition, so to speak among the nations But since we have become a world power there has been no excuse for it and instead of bolstering our pride it has been a source of humiliation to all right thinking Ameri

It is well that this blunder is on the way to correction If we have so far achieved perspective at home as to make decent provision for our presidents and even supply some of our lesser officials with automobiles and private Turkish baths certainly we can afford to uphold the dignity of the United States abroad

MILES STANDISH.

Miles Standish was a short, round Englishman according to the most reliable portraits extant. He was born in Lancashire in 1584 and received a careful education in chopping hewing sticking stabbing and an inhilation in general by means of the sword. He was also carefully instructed in the use of the blunderbus a short, fat guh which when fired shot half a bushel of slugs in one direction and kicked its owner twice as far in the other. It is also said that Standish learned to read in his youth but this was not regarded as important at that time

When the Pilgrims left England and went to Holland Standish went with them though he was not a Pilgrim himself. He embarked in the Mayflower with the other It \$76 people who according to our best families of today came to this country in that little vessel and when the colony of Plymouth was established in 1620 he was chosen commander in chief and was instructed to form an arm; of defense.


