AN OLD-TIME DAY.

Today is set in the exuberant winter ac companiment of that Old-Time Thanksgiving that used to warm the hearts of our fathersand about which our old-timers are prone to talk in lamenting the imaginary change of our seasons.

If ever the autumn has led up to and incinded a typical Thanksgiving it is the autumn of 1914.

During the past week the thermometer has ranged between 14 and 23 degrees. The nights have been clear, the days crisp and the air fragrant with exhibarating ozone of a true winter day. . The man who quarrels with this kind of Thanksgiving needs route himself via the Hill of Dolefulness to the Valley of Pessimism. He cannot have in his soul that which responds to the magic God brews in His mighty crucible of the elements.

And surely we of this country have ample reason to tender praise to God. When we look across the ocean and see the ghastly specter that stalks there, a mighty thankfulness ought to engulf our spirits. There massed millions of men away in a murderous grapple. The rivers run with blood. Death knocks at each door-that of the prince and the peasant. A whole civilization is slowly battering itself into a pulp, and men, helpless, inconsequential atoms, go down as do blades of wheat before the reaper. Tomorrow, comes a fearful reckoning, when Europe, exhausted, robbed of its best blood, must start and build again from the havor of its ruins.

We sit in safety and peace on this side of the water. The blasts of hatred and prejudice may not disturb our households, wither our accumulations nor shatter our

Is not this compensation for the fact that the tide of prosperity does not rise as high as we might wish that it should? And is not the fact that everywhere there are signs of revival of prosperity, that the fundamentals of business are sound further cause for re-

America, the world's great Hope of De mocracy, its storehouse of sanity, rears its untroubled and unthreatened head high above the catachysm that howls over the nations of the old world.

That thought should ring inspiration in every American breast on this Old-Fashioned Thanksgiving Day.

THE LEAVEN WORKING!

The campaign in behalf of the rehabilitation of the school system of Atlanta is already bringing tangible results.

The leaven is working!

Suggestions are coming from board mem bers, from councilmen, from teachers and from citizens.

An issue that affects every child in the city, and that bears gravely on the city's destiny of tomorrow, is one in which the cooperation of every element is imperative.

The obligation of contributing his and her share toward solution is upon every man and woman, every father and mother, every taxpayer, every citizen!

We have, fortunately, time to correct conditions, which, if not remedied, will seriously impair our whole school system. And time is now the essence of the situation.

The problem goes squarely up to the new administration, which assumes office January 1.

It has until next September to work out

If full light on the subject will assure that end. The Constitution means the administration shall have the co-operation of every forward-looking citizen of this community.

THE CHURCH THE SUFFERER.

In a spirit of sweet reasonableness and not of interference, The Constitution de plores the controversy that is threatening to rend one of the foremost churches of Atlanta. Our concern is not to tender gratuitous counsel but with the welfare and development and mission of the church itself, which no good citizen may see subjected to menace without grave misgivings. For, after all is said and done, it is the church that has for ages been the rock of refuge for humanity, the great fortress of safety and sanity against which the tides of sin and vice and injustice and reaction might beat in vain. Men lean on the church when all else material fails. If, then, the church weakens itself by arbitrary and violent methods, especially in an age that has set its face against intolerance and bigotry; if by setting up narrow and dictatorial standards, and applying the lash to those who are disposed to follow their conscience where it conflicts with such standards, it is the church itself that is the chief sufferer.

The Constitution has before this protested against the spirit of ecclesiastical proscription. There is a slavery of the conscience that is worse than a slavery of the body. It is possible to imprison the body and tyrannize over it, and still preserve the spirit and the conscience in all its freedom. But when a minister invades the immemorial and mysterious God-given right of conscience, substituting for it a fixed ecclesiastical mandate, he courts the spirit of rebellion that for centuries has burned in men's bosoms against religious despotism.

At intervals in the history of all denomi nations we find instances of explosive ministers whose antics unfortunately do not react on them as much as on the church itself. It is the organization that sustains the shock of super-enthusiastic partisanship or of too zealous fanaticism. If the consequences reacted only on the individual responsible for them that would be a matter more or less of indifference. But when it is the church Itself that is made to suffer it is a matter for general concern.

One of the blackest chapters in American history is that written in the witch-hurning era of New England. Church proscription was back of that program, and the perpetrators claimed for themselves the sanction of Deity. America itself is largely populated with descendants of those who came here to escape religious slavery. High civic ideals and the church itself have thrived only as that fact has been remembered.

Fortunately, modern religion has opened its windows to the light and banished the specter of ecclesiastical intolerance. Unfortunately, there are occasional local revivals of the old witch-burning and baiting spirit. Unfortunately, too, the men whom it drives from the church are not confined to those nominated in the proscription. Others, their friends and neighbors, fear that later encroachments will be along other lines; that the attack on the right of conscience having succeeded at one point, arbitrary authority may make an attempt at another.

In keen knowledge of what the church has done for the race, and for society and civilization. The Constitution regrets any development that exposes it to the peril of impaired influence. As at all other times in history, men today need the church; need an actual spiritual, sympathetic entity, not a harsh, inflexible, medieval creation of terror and tyranny.

The compass of conscience is the surest guide. The church is dangerously ill-advised that submerges that God-created instrument. substituting standards of ministerial construction-holding in one church and not applying in another-and laying the lash to those of its neighbors who do not subscribe.

KING COTTON'S RIGHT-HAND MAN

E. Lee Worsham, of Atlanta, Who Works Behind the Throne.

(Thomas R. Shipp, in Harper's Weekly.) United States were startled recently when it was discovered that the south, generally regarded as an agricultural section, had so increased its number of cotton mills as to use more cotton than all the factories of Massachusetts, Rhode Island and the other

It was after some post-graduate work at Cornell university that Worsham was appointed Georgia's state entomologist in 1907, and while in this office, which he still holds. waging war against the hostile hordes which threatened the realm of King Cotton—the boll weevil and the wilt, or black root.

The egiton crop of the thirteen cotton-growing states last year amounted to \$500.-900,000, according to the report of the department of agriculture. Mr. Worsham has checked this loss. Substantial evidence of the high regard in which he is held in his home state is shown by the way Georgia legislators have boosted Mr. Worsham's salary in a vain effort to recompense him for the great work he is doing for Georgia and the south.

Great as has been his victory against the Great as has been his victory against the invading hordes, it has come as the result of a powerless, bloodless war. Mr. Worsham favors explosives only in the system of subsolling or vertical farming, to which, like all farmers of the modern school, he is a

Mr. Worsham's valuable discoveries for saving the cotton and other crops have been brought to the attention of every farmer in the south, through his articles in farm magazines, his lectures and other media. By the southern agriculturist he is already well known.

But fate and a wise father decreed against the embryonic poet. Lee Worsham saw the point. One season he saw their entire crop ruined by the black root—all the hard work of a season gone for naught. The poetic mind, with a love for ballads and lyrics, was given a scientific twist, and the south, the nation as a whole, has profited.

He left the University of Georgia in 1994, with the well-defined purpose in his mind to put an end to every bug that blighted a crop and every disease that threatened plants, shrubs and trees.

Worsham works unceasingly at his duties as leader in the fight against crop-destroying diseases and insects. His headquarters are at Atlanta, but he travels almost continually, forming cotton-brieders' and farmers' clubs, lecturing at universities and to farmers from special trains, and answering thousands of letters asking for advice in the farmers' continuous warfare against the pests that threaten their crops. pests that threaten their crops

GIRLS AT ENGLISH COMMERCIAL HIGH SCHOOL FORCED TO WEAR GLASSES, LIGHTING IS SO POOR

More than two-thirds of the girls who attend the English Commercial High school are forced to wear eyeglasses because of the inadequate lighting of that building, according to Mrs. A. T. Wise, principal of the

nool. The English Commercial is located in the

The English Commercial is located in the old annex of the Crew street school. Tho building is in an alarming state of dilapidation. The only remedy for the condition is a new building, for which the board has provided \$100,000 in its budget for 1915.

When the English Commercial was taken away from the Girls' High school, there were only 142 students in the classes. At the present time the school is training 251 girls. The reason the school was forced to get individual quarters was because it was crowded out of the Girls' High school.

"The school has grown in proportion to every other school in the city." Mrs. Wise said, "and at present it is necessary for the city to provide additional quarters. The

classes cannot be taught much longer in this building, if the city expects to get the best results.

classes cannot be taught much longer in this building, if the city expects to get the best results.

"We are now crowded to the utmost; in fact, we have not got enough room for a library. There is barely space in the building to place the girls, and next year, when it is expected that the increase will be about 150 over the number of students now in attendance, the conditions will be dreadful.

"The school is doing good work. This fact is testified to by hundreds of business men who have taken our graduates into their places of business.

"Last year we graduated forty girls, and founteen out of the class had positions three weeks before they graduated."

Every available inch of space has been made use of by the school in an effort to give the children comfort. The typewriter room, where fifty-two girls are constantly at practice, is dark even when the sun is shining brightest.

"A Brave Newspaper"

United States on Thanksgiving day will be due to the promise and practical assurance of a revival of business activity, the first symptoms of which will be evident soon after the dist of the new year. Already the managers of some of the larger industrial corporations are confident that they will spend a more pleasant Thanksgiving this year than was their lot in 1913. For these managers are already beginning to contem-plate a renewal of dividend payments some time in the winter or early spring, according as their next half-year begins. the large corporations found it expedient to suspend dividend payments beginning two years ago, and others, like the United States Steel corporation, have found it the part of wisdom to reduce the dividend rate. Now. with the promise of continued purchases by Europe in the United States and in enormous

Europe in the United States and in enormous amounts of manufactured commodities, there are the best reasons for thinking that earnings will be so good that it will be practicable to resume dividend payments in the late winter or early spring.

That is one of the best of the signs that hint at returning business activity. Holders of stocks in some of the manufacturing corporations have had a lean year or two and in July of this year there seemed to be no prospects that this leanness would pass away for a long time. Now, the prospects are of the best and from all over the country, at least east of the Mississippi river, there come to this city reports of various resumptions not merely of normal activity but in addition activity such as these manufacturers have never known.

Difficult to Obtain Details.

It is difficult to obtain details which tell the story of this enormous international trade which has come to us as a conse-quence of the European war. But there do wass from lips to lips authentic reports tell-

quence of the European war. But there do pass from lips to lips authentic reports telling of the daily orders which some of our manufacturing establishments are now receiving. They run all the way from \$100,000 a day to \$1,000,000 the next day, and so on orders of that kind belig now daily received by many of the manufacturing concerns. Sometimes reports that seem to be wide apart reach New York, one telling of great activity in certain districts and another reporting continued business stagnation. That is noticeably true of the reports which come from New England. Some of them tell of unprecedented activity, requiring day and night operation of the factories and considerable enlargement of the plants through hiring of available buildings. On the other hand, the reports from New England are that general business does not show much sign of any improvement.

These reports, however, are not inconstruct. The great manufacturing plants

eign of any improvement.

These reports, however, are not inconstatent. The great manufacturing plants are only beginning to turn out an enormous output representing orders from across the sea. It takes a little while for stimulus of that kind to reach from the manufacturers to the retail merchants and the small manufacturers. Therefore, those in New England who speak of business conditions as still not very good are referring to present condi-tions, although recently it has been observed that there is an undertone of hope in some of the statements received here from New England.

From the middle west have been received reports within a few days which suggest that people who dwell there may feel a sense of gratitude upon the Thanksgiving holiday. Many of the great manufacturers in the middle west maintain headquarters or agencies in this city. Some of these report that they are now straining every nerve in order to secure the facilities which they need if they are to meet the demands made upon them for their commodities. This is understood to be especially true of Michigan. Some of the great manufacturing establishments in that state are increasing their plants and taking on skilled labor with the promise of steady time and good pay. In Wisconsin, there has been observed a gratifying increase in manufacturing activity and the reports from one of the largest manufacturing establishments in that state indicate that its managers believe that the year 1915 will be identified as the year of recovery from business stagnation and the setting in of activity such as the country has never known.

In and around Cincinnati, according to reports received in this city, there begins to be observed large increase in manufacturing operations. Some of these are necessary in order to facilitate the operation of some of the factories in New England which are now occupied with earnest attempt to meet the heavy demands made upon them, princi-
