

FRANK'S SENTENCE IS COMMUTED BY SLATON

SMASHING RUSSIANS, TEUTONS ARE MOVING TO CAPTURE LEMBERG

Further Progress of the Austro-Germans Reported North and South of the Galician Capital—A Long Line of Russian Trenches Reported Stormed.

TEUTON ALLIES PIN THEIR WHOLE FAITH ON CRUSHING RUSSIA

That Done They Hope to Be Able to Throw Tremendous Weight of Men and Metal Into the West—This Week Will See the Culmination of One of the Great Phases of the World Conflict.

London, June 20.—After seven weeks' battering across Galicia, during which the Russians have been thrown back more than 150 miles, the Austro-Germans today are as close to Lemberg as were the Germans to Paris last fall.

Never, perhaps, since before the battle of the Marne, have the Teutonic allies appeared so confident of success. Having failed in their original plan of crushing France and then turning to Russia, they have reserved the order of their strategy, and now, judging by the expenditure of life and ammunition in Galicia, they have pinned their whole faith on paralyzing the Russian army to permit the throwing of a tremendous weight of men and metal into the west, there either to break through the Franco-British line or force an interminable period of sanguinary warfare.

A dispatch from Copenhagen tonight says that the German emperor himself has taken supreme command of the Galician campaign, establishing his headquarters in Silesia, as near to the front as practicable.

CRISIS OF DRIVE SEEMS AT HAND.

Meanwhile the German official communication records the further progress of the Austro-German forces toward Lemberg, both to the north and south of the city. It claims, as well, that the Russians have been cleared from parts of the Dniester to the south. The crisis of the Austro-German drive is evidently at hand. Grodek is secure in the possession of Generals von Mackensen's men, and the Germans and the Austrian corps under Field Marshal von Arz are reported by Berlin to be storming and capturing one after another, Russian trenches along the entire front before Lemberg, extending from Nawa Ruska, in the north, to Janow, only eleven miles from the Galician capital.

This front is twenty-four miles in extent, and the fighting here has been stubborn. To the south between Grodek and the Dniester marshes, the Russians also are being hard pressed.

CAN RUSSIANS STOP TEUTONS?

The question England and her allies are asking is whether Grand Duke Nicholas can emulate Joffre's tactics of last fall and check the Austro-Germans at the gates of Lemberg. Optimists point out that the grand duke checked them almost at the gates of Waraw, just as General Joffre stopped the Germans before Paris and Field Marshal Sir John French stopped them before Trenchon and Calais.

It is argued further that even should Lemberg fall, the Russians can drop back to equally formidable positions, utilizing the rivers and swamps, and it is the British contention that they thus could hold out for months. England and France in the meantime send to their aid men and munitions, if necessary.

TURN DOWN CLUBS AND BEER SALOONS COUNCIL IS URGED

Resolutions Passed at Gathering at Grand Theater, Held Under Auspices Men and Religion Movement.

The Men and Religion Forward Movement mass meeting Sunday afternoon at the Grand adopted unanimously resolutions petitioning the mayor and council of Atlanta to refuse to license locker clubs and beer saloons at Monday's meeting of council, and further petitioning mayor and council to revoke the license of every locker club and saloon in Atlanta whose license does not expire July 1.

The final provision of the resolutions is that in event mayor and council should again license locker clubs and saloons and the police department continues to fail to close them, a committee shall be appointed by the chairman of the meeting to take the necessary steps to enjoin the saloons and locker clubs.

The resolutions also direct the attention of mayor and council and the chief of police to prima facie evidence of the guilt of saloons and locker clubs of violation of the prohibition law as shown by United States liquor licenses held by each.

Committee Is Named. A resolution was adopted directing John J. Egan, permanent chairman of the meeting, to appoint a committee to present these resolutions to Mayor Edward and council at Monday afternoon meeting, and urge upon them that the sense of the resolutions be followed.

Although the afternoon was sweltering hot, there was an attendance of about 1,300 or 1,500 people at the meeting at the Grand theater.

John J. Egan was elected permanent chairman. The speakers at the meeting were Dr. John E. White, pastor of the Second Baptist church, and Dr. J. B. Jackson, of the Men and Religion Forward Movement, executive committee.

The resolutions were unanimously adopted. Copies of the resolutions were sent to the mayor and council, and to the police board, Mayor James G. Woodward, Chairman Edwin Johnson, of the police committee, Councilman C. C. Moore, the locker clubs, beer saloons, the social clubs, church members affiliated with such clubs, and the public generally, to urge them to control the law.

WARDEN'S WIFE DEAD IN HER BLAZING BED

Mrs. Allen formerly was prima donna of a company presenting "The Merry Widow." Her maiden name was Odette Malzeau Bordoux. She was 34 years old.

Allen was best known among penologists for his extension of the honor system among convicts. Several hundred of the more than 1,600 prisoners have been at comparative liberty during the last two summers, working on state farms and road building at honor camps.

The sentence of Leo M. Frank, condemned to die for the murder of Mary Phagan on Memorial day two years ago, was commuted late last night by Governor John M. Slaton to life imprisonment.

TEUTONS STORM RUSS TRENCHES

Berlin, June 20.—(Via London)—General Mackensen's armies are continuing their advance on Lemberg, capturing Grodek and other positions taken trenches one after another along a front of almost 24 miles northeast of the city. The German cossacks are making a desperate stand, according to a German army staff statement.

The communication reads: West of the La Basse canal and on the front north of Arras we repulsed several partial attacks with sanguinary losses for the enemy. A French division which attacked after blowing up a trench, was shot down. The French of the Parrot forest led to local fighting in which we maintained the upper hand. HEIGHTS CARRIED BY THE ITALIANS

Rome, June 20.—(Via Paris)—An army headquarters statement most of which is devoted to details of the two days struggle for the heights on the left bank of the Isonzo river near Plava says that the Italians took the last of these heights June 17 and that while the Italian losses were heavy the results attained were important.

The communication says that on the Isonzo which the Italians passed by main force the Austrians positions have been taken one after another by assault. The statement says:

Artillery duels and engagements between small bodies occupied several points on the front on June 15. The enemy made fresh attacks on Breifofel and attempted to approach the head of the Valona pass. They were repulsed in each case.

Now details now have been received of the struggle which continued two days and a night for the heights on the left bank of the Isonzo river commencing at Plava. The struggle concerning the Isonzo here had been stymied by the enemy. We threw bridges across during the night and at dawn on the sixteenth our troops attacked. The movement was carried out all day slowly on account of the enemy's resistance.

Numerous heavy guns, even 12 inch guns, were concealed in commanding positions which were difficult for our artillery to reach. Nevertheless our troops by repeated bayonet charges debouched on the enemy's first line toward evening. During the night the enemy counter attacked unsuccessfully.

On the 17th our troops completed their success by carrying the heights still in the hands of the enemy. The latter retreated with his main force of artillery and machine guns, which was followed up by another counter attack by fresh troops. The enemy was completely driven back at the point of the bayonet. We made more than 500 prisoners. Our losses were serious, but the results obtained were important.

On the Isonzo which we passed by main force the enemy's positions have been one after another taken by assault. Attempts to assume the offensive by numerous seasoned troops have been constantly repulsed.

AUSTRIAN WARSHIPS SHELL ITALIAN COAST

Vienna, June 20.—(Via Amsterdam)—An Austrian official statement says: Several of our cruisers and torpedo boats on Thursday and Friday undertook an expedition along the Italian coast from the frontier of L'Impire to Fano. They destroyed the wireless stations at the mouth of the Tagliamento river and near Ancona and the railway bridges near Rimini, across the Metauro and Arolla rivers. All units returned safely.

THIRD WEEK OF PROBE OF "CRIBBING" SCANDAL

Annapolis, Md., June 20.—The court of inquiry tomorrow will begin its third week of investigation to get to the bottom of the "cribbing" scandal at the naval academy. Two weeks ago the inquiry apparently has taken to get near the real point in the case—the manner in which advance copies of the actual examination in Spanish were obtained.

Who procured these copies and then mailed them to midshipman J. E. Moore is as much a mystery as ever. Advocate Watt, it is expected, will continue his efforts today Saturday to determine whether the fund was started by midshipman for the purpose of bribing someone to procure the examinations.

BRITISH LOSING AT DARDANELLES

According to Report Via Berlin—Losses Are Said to Be Heavy and Yielding Ground Daily.

Berlin, June 20.—(Via Wireless to Bayville, N. Y.)—The Associated Press correspondent in the Dardanelles has transmitted the following in an undated dispatch: British losses at Avl Burnu thus far are estimated at from 10,000 to 15,000 men. Turkish losses are somewhat lower although the Turks constantly are on the offensive and they make bayonet attacks almost every night.

Field Marshal Liman von Sanders, the German commander, is highly optimistic regarding the outcome of the operations. He declared to the Associated Press that not only are the British unable to make progress, but they are losing ground daily.

With the British fleet unable to assist in the land operations because of the submarine menace the British hold on Avl Burnu is apparently in no way as secure as it well treated.

TURKS FIGHT MOST FAIRLY

Special efforts are being made by the department to make this year's matches as the first held in Florida since the war. The attendance is expected to be unprecedentedly large because the government now has a special appropriation to pay the transportation of state teams.

The soldiers will reach Jacksonville in early September and the matches will begin in late September. They will be held at Jacksonville and the Southern Rifle Association matches as well as during the national association and national matches proper.

COLUMBIA FOR FLAG SHIP OF SUBMARINE FLOTILLA

London, June 21.—(346 a. m.)—Reports from Germany to The Times quote the statement of a German flight captain that the Taube type of airship has been discarded as too unstable and unsatisfactory for military uses as are other types of monoplane because of their inability to carry a sufficient load and the Germans admit the French are superior in field aeronautics.


