MRS. BALLUE SOBS FORTH ACCIDENT STORY

Several hours of questioning brings out her confession.

Severe Questioning Draws Out Explanation Which Lanford Believes—Couple Out on Bond.

Mrs. Lucy Ballue, of 18 Lynch Street, confessed to Chief Detectives Newport Lanford Saturday morning that she shot Captain A. C. Thompson, County Sheriff, in the reception room of the Orin Club last night. She declares the shooting was accidental, and that Captain Thompson's revolver was discharged while she was examining it.

Tells How It Happened.

"Captain Thompson called me up by telephone yesterday," she said, "and made an appointment for 8 o'clock. I met him at Whitehall Street, and after we had a drink of wine, he went out for a stroll, and came back with a gun in his hand. When we came into the club again he was holding the gun, and I saw the plan and was very talking. It was hot, and took off his coat. He came over and laid the coat and the gun on the table. I saw the plan and he went and sat down suddenly I started up and saw the revolver.
