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CONLEY'S STORY IS STILL CENTER OF FIGHT IN FRANK CASE

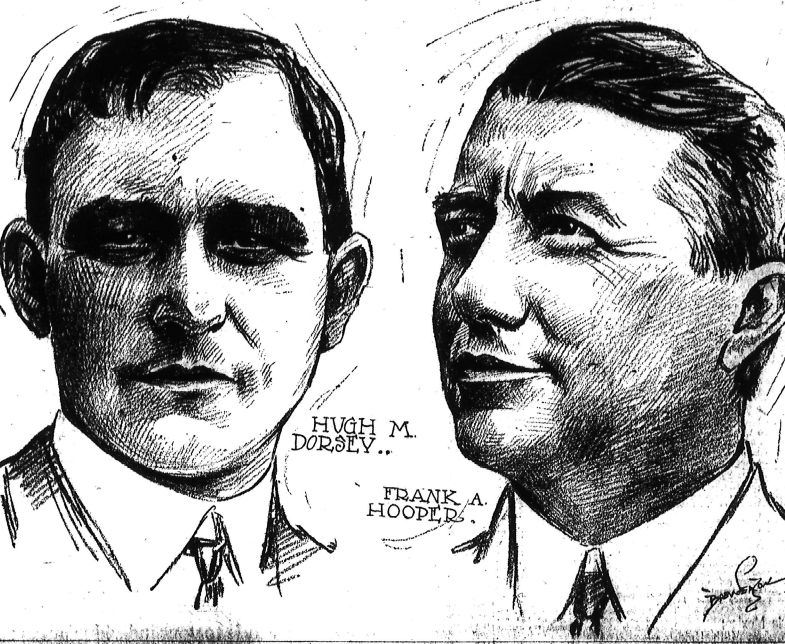
After Two Weeks of Testimony Only Evidence Directly Linking Frank With the Crime Is the Sensational Statement Made on the Stand by Negro Sweeper Summary of Developments in Trial to Date

STATE HAS INTRODUCED 34 WITNESSES, DEFENSE 10

A Synopsis of the Evidence Presented by Both Sides Shows Just What the State Has Sought to Prove and How the Defense Has Begun Its Fight to Convince Jury of Frank's Innocence

For two long and tedious weeks Leo M. Frank, indicted for the murder of Mary Phagan, has been on trial for his life. During those two weeks the courtroom has been filled with testimony, exhibits, documents, books, diagrams, photographs and illustrations. The prosecution has introduced 34 witnesses, the defense 10. The remarkable story of James Conley, the negro sweeper, directly connects the defendant with the crime, and even in this long and tedious trial it has been established that he actually saw Frank do the deed.

COMPLETE SYSTEM OF RURAL BANKS URGED IN SENATE

Senator Fletcher, Back From European Investigation, Introduces Important and Highly Interesting Bill

WASHINGTON, Aug. 9.—The fruits of the recent European investigation of rural credit by an American commission were made today in the senate by Senator Fletcher, of Florida, who introduced a comprehensive bill to provide for the establishment, operation, management and control of a national rural banking system. Senator Fletcher, who was chairman of the commission that made the European investigation, addressed the senate in explanation of the bill, which is believed may be passed during the session.

WITNESS FOUND WHO SAW MARY PHAGAN ON WAY TO FACTORY

George T. Kendley, Street Car Conductor, Declares He Saw Little Girl About Noon on April 26 as She Stepped From Curb on Forsyth Street, Bridge to Cross Alabama Street, Where His Car Was Stopped

BOTH SIDES READY TO GRILL EVERY WITNESS

Attorneys Think There is Little Chance of the Trial Ending This Week—Much Testimony is Expected in Rebuttal and All Indications Saturday Night Ware Trial Would Run Into Its Fourth Week

The trial of Leo M. Frank for the murder of Mary Phagan will last from six days to two weeks longer, according to the varying estimates of the attorneys engaged with the case. It is concluded that it will take the depositions at least four days of the week to complete the presentation of the case. It will take several days to get in the rebuttal testimony, and the arguments will probably take two days before the witness goes to the twelve men who will decide Frank's fate.

SAW HER ON BRIDGE

The defense scored when W. M. Matthews, street car motorman, testified that Mary Phagan left his car about 12:15 on the afternoon of April 26 as she went along Forsyth street, toward Forsyth street. Now the question is pending itself to go after Matthews.

Caused the Wreck

August 9, 1918. A statement of the wreck of the train bearing the remains of Senator Johnston, issued by the division officers of the Southern railway says: "On today two mile south of North E. C. second division of train No. 10, carrying the remains of United States Senator Johnston, of Alabama, was wrecked. The engine, two baggage cars and the Pullman private car with the funeral casket remained on the rails.
