"Write 'light-watchman,'" the city detectives are said to have commanded James Conley, negro sweeper at the pencil factory, last Wednesday.

The result is said to have been "light-watch." So also the note found in the handwriting of Mary Phagan spotted it. The detectives regard this strongly corroborative of Conley's admission that he wrote them, however, at the dictation of Leo M. Frank, superintendent of the pencil factory, under indictment for the murder of his daughter, and in place of full evidence in his story, it is said, since he has declared that he did the writing on Saturday afternoon instead of on Friday afternoon as he first swore, and has gone into a defensive line of attack.

He confessed himself and responded to Mr. Frank's call.
