

FREE SONS SEND PETITION.

**Ask That Frank Have a Chance to
Prove His Innocence.**

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., May 23.—The Free Sons of Israel, which opened its convention in the Hotel Rudolph today, will send a petition to the Governor of Georgia, asking him the commute the death sentence of Leo Frank that he may have the opportunity to establish his innocence.

The petition was suggested by President M. S. Stern in his annual address today. Mr. Stern said he believed half the people of the United States were convinced that there was not sufficient evidence against Frank to warrant his execution.
